#### Made by Chairman Roylance Who Announced Temporary Officers.

[Special to the News.'] Provo, Sept. 16 .- The Cache valley, Boxelder, and other delegations north of Ogden arrived in this city on time, 10:30 a. m., over the Oregon Short Line. The train with the Salt Lake and Weber county delegations, with about 175 people on board, however, did not reach here until 11:50, three-quarters of an hour late. The loss of time was caused by a setback on one of the cars and side tracking the other train, at the Rio Grande depot in this city. The Salt Lake and Weber delegations were met by the Amphion band of Provo, which struck up a lively air and headed the procession to the opera house, where the preliminaries were begun shortly before noon.
