RETURN FROM MEXICO.

Salt Lake Excursion Party Back From City of Montezumas.

A portion of the Mexican excursion party, which left this city to visit the southern country Feb. 15, returned to Salt Lake yesterday. The party con-sists of Hon. and Mrs. Joseph Kimbah and Mr. J. P. Sprunt of this city and President James Jensen of Sandy. Mr Kimball in speaking of their tr.p. said it had been a most enjoyable one, and that many sights had been seen in the former kinggom of the Montezumas. A bull fight was witnessed by the Americans, and they were fortunate in beholding the farewell appearance of Mexico's greatest matador. "We visited the excavations being carried on by the Mexican govern-ment," said Mr. Kimball, "and saw the ancient pyramids in their original primitive state.
