"It is a missiatement to say that we are endeavoring to fix one price for the rages of workingmon of any one class. What we aim at is to establish a min-imum of wages, below which a workingman will not be obliged to labor. Be-cause a minimum is established it does not follow that a worker cannot receive

more than that. "We are engaged in promoting the general welfare of the working classes. and are aiming at their general im-provement, rather than trying to get one preferred position for some particu-lar individual. It may be true that there are cases where a laboring man advances beyond his co-laborers, but it is usually at the expense of others. Better the conditions of the craft generally and all will profit."

POSTOFFICES IN TURKEY.

State Department Not Informed of Efforts to Suppress Foreign Ones.

Washington, May 12 .- Mr. Leishman, our minister to Constantinople, up to this time has not communicated with the state department respecting the trouble at the Turkish capital over the trouble at the furkish capital over the efforts of the porte to suppress the foreign postoffices. Inquiry here dis-closes the fact that the United States is one of the few great powers which does not maintain an absolutely independent postal service between Con-stantinople and the outside world. The others have a system of closed mail bouches by which mails are not pernitted to pass through the Turkish ands while in transit between the borer and the embsasies at Constanti-

The British government has a fine postoffice building not far from its em-bassy, and Austria and France also bassy, and Austria and France also have suitable postal establishments at Constantinople. These were established originally not so much from a lack of confidence in the integrity of the Turk-ish government as from the inferior character of the Turkish postal service

character of the utrain postal service some years ago. It is possible for any foreign citizen-resident in Constantineple to receive his maits directly upon application to the postoffice at his embassy. The privilege is not limited to embassy at-taches or official mail and this fact has privilege is not limited to embassy at-taches or official mail and this fact has long been a matter of discontent for the Turks, who, having sought to im-prove their own postal service by plac-

prove their own postal service by plac-ing it under the direction of German experts, feel that they have a right to get rid of these foreign offices, which they claim facilitate emuggling. The United States government not having a postoffice of its own always has made use of the facilities of the French, Austrian and British postal system in Constantinople.

Tuberculosis Congress.

New York, May 13 .-- The American congress of tuberculosis and the Medi-co-Legal society will meet in joint sesco-Legal society will meet in joint ses-sion in this city Wednesday and Thurs-day. There will be delegates from many of the states and territories and from Canada, Mexico and Nicaragua. All of the South American states have been asked to send delegates. Among the subjects discussed will be preventive legislation, the treatment and cure of tuberculosis and climatic conditions.
