

opposed it. Hooker moved to indefinitely postpone the resolution; carried, 73 to 42. On motion of McKenna, all officers of the last House were renominated *vive voce*.

The report of the Secretary of War recommends an increase of the army to 30,000, as Sherman suggests. The various topics of change in the army chief's report are commented on. Attention is called to the Coast defence, which are regarded by the Secretary as very essential. He believes in a high standard of admission into the military academy.

The expenditures of the War Department for the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1881, were \$42,122,000. The appropriations for 1882 were \$44,889,900.

**GALVESTON, 3.**—The *News*' Fortworth special of to-day says: The Pacific track was connected with that of the Southern Pacific at 6 o'clock yesterday evening at Blanco. The two last set of spikes were driven by Mrs. Wm. Stall and Mrs. R. Montgomery, the latter the daughter of Gen. Dodge. The last two spikes were driven by H. M. Hoxie and D. W. Washburn, by the light of bonfires. The first engine passed over from the Texas & Pacific to the Southern Pacific track, and after the placing of gold and silver coins on the track by the officers present, the joyous party broke up.

**JERSEY CITY, 3.**—John Hilyard, president of the Mechanics' Bank, which suspended on November 7th, was convicted of conspiracy to defraud, and was sentenced to 18 months in the State Prison. The secretary, one of the directors, was fined \$500. Hilyard's sentence was applauded. He broke down, and his wife fainted.

**BOSTON, 3.**—A special engine with caboose running west on the N. Y. and N. E. road, collided with the east bound train near Thomasson, this afternoon. The engineer had orders to keep out of the way of the passenger train, but the order seems to have been forgotten and the special proceeded on the other train's time, hence the collision. The engineer and conductor were killed, and the fireman badly bruised on the passenger. About a dozen persons were injured.

**LOS VEGAS, 3.**—Seven prisoners, including John J. Webb, under life sentence for murder, and Dave Rudabaugh, escaped from jail here this morning. Rudabaugh was a member of the notorious "Billy the Kid's" band, and was sentenced to be hung for murder.

**WASHINGTON, 5.**—Speaker Randall appeared. He did not understand why he was subpoenaed. Scoville will, this afternoon, call on the President and try to get him to assent to appear. Guiteau says he had several interviews with Arthur, and it is known that he has written the President several letters, which the defense want to have go on record. Guiteau was unusually scared to-day, and begged the officers to take him into court by the back entrance and with trembling and cringing gait, shuffled through the angry crowd. Abject fear was depicted upon his face and he did not regain his composure for several minutes.

The House is assembling for the first regular session of the 47th Congress, and is drawing a large number of visitors. Keifer stood for a short time behind the desks and was warmly congratulated by his colleagues.

At noon, Clerk Adams called the body to order and announced the opening of the session. He then called the roll. The roll call showed 290 representatives present, the absentees being Morey, Sealey, Mills and Denster.

Nominations for Speaker being in order, Keifer was put in nomination by Robeson, Randall by House, and Ford by Murch Burrows, of Michigan. Holman and Ladd were appointed tellers.

The roll call resulted in the whole number of votes being 285; necessary for the choice, 143. The vote stood: For Keifer, 148; Randall, 129; Ford, 8. Those voting for Ford were Brumm, Burrows, of Missouri; Hazleton, Jones, of Texas; Ladd, Mosgrove, Murch and Rice, of Missouri. None of the candidates voted. Fullers and Mahone, Virginia readjusters, voted for Keifer.

## FOREIGN.

**ST. PETERSBURG, 30.**—It appears that Sanspowsky asked first for General Ignatieff of the bureau of ministry, and not finding him attempted to kill his adjutant, Tschervine, instead.

Another printing office has been discovered in Berigrahala street,

with a quantity of proclamations, in which the authors ask pardon for what they are about to do, as it is for the benefit of all. They announce that they must make a supreme effort in this, which they say will be the finishing stroke.

Gen. Ignatieff has tendered his resignation to the Emperor.

**LONDON, 30.**—Three tenants on Lord Kenmore's estate, Mill Street, Cork County, were fired at last evening, and wounded in the legs. The tenants had paid rent. Three cows belonging to rent paying farmers near Cork, were found ripped open. This class of outrages is again increasing. Lord Doneraul has just discharged all the laborers on his estate, because he was unable to discover who battered an entire flock of sheep to death. Opposition to rent paying is especially marked in Limerick County.

**PARIS, 30.**—At the last meeting of the consul commission, convened by De Lesseps, to consider a series of questions prior to the main works at Panama being undertaken, the replies of the commission all favored the plan the company's engineer recites, who will return to Panama the 5th of December, and will commence work immediately. The Isthmus will be attacked at three points simultaneously.

**PARIS, 1.**—The return of the nomination of the senatorial elections are complete except five departments, and foreshadow a republican gain of 19 seats at the elections in January.

**VIENNA, 1.**—A shock of earthquake occurred at Agram, on Wednesday, the severest that has been experienced since the great catastrophe of November 1880.

**ST. PETERSBURG, 1.**—The court-martial in the case of Prince Scherwazhidiz found him guilty of wounding a merchant last summer, and sentenced him to exile in Archangel, with a deprivation of his rights as a nobleman. General Wagnowski, minister of war, will submit the sentence to the Czar and will recommend its commutation to three years confinement in a fortress, without a deprivation of rights.

**LONDON, 1.**—Reports of disasters on the steamer *Glendevon*, from Norfolk for Liverpool towed into Queenstown and landed the crew of the German bark *Lohengrin*. The remainder of the crew were drowned. The Dutch steamer *Custon*, Captain Vesser, from Amsterdam for New York, returned to port with her cargo shifted. She lost her compass and sails and had her aft hatch stove. The Spanish steamer *Catalonia*, Liverpool for New Orleans, lost her boats and sustained other damage. Nearly all the Yarmouth smacks in the recent storm have returned. Loss of life occurred in seven cases. The disabled steamer passed yesterday by the British steamer *Hazen* was the *State of Indiana*; her main shaft was broken. A steam tug has gone to her assistance.

The *Times* says: From the resolution of Government in regard to the meeting of Parliament, we infer that hopes are entertained of a rapid change in the aspect of Irish affairs.

At a meeting of the Land League of Great Britain, the secretary reported new branches being opened at an average rate of a dozen a week. Subscriptions are increasing.

Boynton was released from jail on condition that he leave the country. All suspects in Kilmainham jail commenced subsisting on prison fare to-day.

Two hundred cattle of the grazing farm at Corrowgill have been mutilated.

Patrick Egan cabled the Irish national convention in Chicago, urging it to support the no rent policy.

It appears highly probable that in a fortnight hence hunting in Ireland will be entirely stopped and £1,000 sterling be diverted into other channels.

One thousand tenants in Roscommon refuse to pay rent. They declare they will not apply to the land court.

A farmer living near Auzheras, County Leitrim, was assaulted by a body of armed men last evening, and received 12 wounds. It is believed his injuries will prove fatal. He had paid his rent.

**PARIS, 30.**—At a meeting of the consultative commission of the Panama Canal, the committee approved the plan for creating a temporary shelter port at Colon, at a spot where maritime operations can be carried on at all seasons. From this port, and as far as ten kilometres, the land digging is about to be commenced with dredges and excavators.

The second great centre of the work will be set up in the middle of the Isthmus on the summit of the Culebra, and lastly the earth derived from this will seem to form a great bar at Ganiboa, which is to keep back the waters of the Chagres.

Hannibal Hamlin, U. S. minister to Spain, to-day paid separate visits to Prest. Grevy and Gambetta, both of whom received Hamlin with cordiality, and congratulated him upon the part he took in the events leading to the abolition of slavery in the United States. They also dwelt upon the sympathies of France for the United States, and said they hoped to see the friendly relations between the two sister republics draw still closer.

**ROME, 1.**—Cardinal Jacobini, papal secretary of state, will avail himself of the presence of Cardinal Guibert, archbishop of Paris, and other French prelates on the occasion of the forthcoming ceremony of canonization, to confer with them in relation to religious affairs in France. It is generally believed the Vatican will, as long as possible, pursue a policy of temporization towards the French government.

**BELGRADE, 1.**—Government will undertake to introduce in the Skupstina, in March, a Jews emancipation bill in conformity with the treaty of Berlin. Servian Jews will be by no means placed on an equality with Jews who are Austrian subjects.

**LONDON, 2.**—The Balloon Associated Company, of which Leigh Smith is a member, urge the government to dispatch an expedition to the relief of Smith. The French government has authorized the Russian Minister, resident at Tunis, to return to France to carry on personally the prosecution instituted in his behalf by Barthelmy of St. Heillers, against the manager and editor of the *Entrantsigente*, for slander.

**LONDON, 3.**—Copious reports of Guiteau's trial continue to be telegraphed daily, and seem likely to discredit permanently the American courts with the English public. The *Times* remarks that the trial astonishes and shocks English readers. Lawyers declare that no such spectacle of judicial incapacity has ever been seen. The constantly recurring scenes, the license allowed Guiteau, the demeanor of the spectators, the applause bestowed on Scoville, the indecent demonstrations of every kind tolerated by the judge, and his utter inability to keep order or control the proceedings in his own court, are all unhappily regarded as typical instead of exceptional. Lawyers, moreover, consider the examination of Guiteau touching his own insanity as a scandalous innovation.

The *Times* discussing the system of allowing the prisoner to give evidence says: The incidents at Guiteau's trial ought not to prejudice our decision in regard to this pertinent question; his boisterous vanity would have insured scenes at his trial under any system.

Lowell reached Paris Monday, returning from Rome. He was presented to-day to President Grevy by Morton, and will arrive in London Tuesday, when he resumes charge of the legation, which he left with Happin, the secretary, two months ago. The reported resolve of the President to retain Lowell as Minister, profoundly gratifies English and Americans alike.

**DUBLIN, 3.**—The latest advices from the Land Court show that there are to this date 55,000 applications. They are increasing at the rate of 500 each day.

There have been only 178 decisions as the result of four weeks' work, being at the rate of two and a half decisions per day to each commission.

In Limerick to-day civilians attacked a party of soldiers in a public house. The military were called from the barracks and cleared the streets at the point of the bayonet.

**MADRID, 3.**—The Council of Ministers to-day examined the question of slavery in Cuba. The Minister for the Colonies explained the instructions given to the new Governor, Pendergas, for positive prohibition of corporal punishment of slaves, for the strict application of the laws of 1870 and 1880, to increase the number of emancipations and also encourage the formation of juntas and other modes to protect the freedmen. The Council is seriously examining plans for the immediate extinction of slavery with compensation to planters. Immediate abolishing will be introduced simultaneously with vigorous measure to provide Cuba with free labor, Chi-

nese, Indian, Creole and military colonists, and encouragement to European immigration.

**ROME, 3.**—At a consistory to-day, after a short allocution, the Pope asked the dignitaries assembled, whether they approved the project for the canonization of the following named four: Labre, Derossi, Laurenti and Claire. A unanimous approval was expressed.
