ARGUMENTS HEARD

Committee Will Recommend That The Request be Granted.

AMENDMENTS WERE MADE.

Speeches in Behalf of Interurban Road And Protestants Had Their Say-City Attorney Has Document.

After listening to arguments in behalf of the proposed interurban franchise and the protests of the Eighth West Improvement league against certain conditions in the same, the committees on municipal laws and streets of the city council went into executive session last night and made amendments to the franchise which met the approval of the protestants and the applicants and decided to recommend the passage of the franchise as amended at the meeting of the city council on next Monday evening. The franchise and amend-ments were turned over to the city attorney with instructions to look into the legal questions and add the amendments recommended and report to the council at the next meeting.

Atty. Frank Pierce, representing Mr. Clark and his associates, who are ask-Clark and his associates, who are asking for the franchise, spoke in behalf of the franchise, as did also Judge E. F. Colburn, representing the Real Estate association, and G. W. Purcell, representing the outside capital interested in the proposition. Atty, I. E. Willey presented the protests of the Eighth West Improvement league and was assisted by two other members of the league. These arguments were made in a special meeting of the council and at their renclusion the committees went into executive session in the mayor's office, and made the amendments suggested by the protestants and others.

WHAT IT PROVIDES.

The franchise provides for a right of way over certain streets from Second South and East Temple west to Second West, thence south to Fourth South, thence west to Eighth West, thence south to the city limits. Also along Eighth West and other streets north to the northern limits of the city limits. to the northern limits of the city. In support of the franchise Atty, Pierce stated that Mr. Clark asked for the same in behalf of a corporation to be organized under the laws of this state. The men back of it, he said, are in a position to handle the financial end of the proposition and continue the proposition. the proposition and construct the road without any delay.

PROTEST PRESENTED.

Mr. Willey presented the protest of the league, and stated that the residents of Eighth West were not protesting against the road coming into the city, but they thought that it should enter on some other street because Eighth West is the best resi-dence street in the western part of the city and should be preserved as such. He urged that the company construct its line on Seventh West street. If Eighth West must be used thought that the residents on that Firest should have some concession from the company. Under the arrangement as proposed in the franbe compeled to pay a 10 cent fare in order to ride to any other part of the rity east of East Temple street as the new company could not transfer to the lines of the present company. He preed that some arrangement be made for a transfer system between the two

TO PARK STREETS.

He also contended that Eighth West was discriminated against in the matler of handling freight by the company and also as to parking the streets. The franchise required the company to park all streets east of Eighth West and he thought that it should street, and he thought that it should be parked also. Then, too, the franchise permits the company to run freight rars on Eighth West at all hours of the day while east of Eighth West freight could only be hauled between midnight and 6 o'clock in the morning. This, he contended, would permit the tompany to make a regular freight yard of Eighth West street.

At the conclusion of Mr. Willey's remarks, Judge E. F. Colburn made an lloquent speech in favor of the franchise. He pointed out the great commercial advantage which the road

mercial advantage which the road would be to the city by putting it in close connection with Bingham, Gar-ield and the surrounding country for many miles and bringing the trade to the city from those districts. He told of the great advancement of eastern litles and Los Angeles since the estab-ishment of interurban roads around them, and said that the proposed road would make a greater Sait Lake and rould push it forward at a rapid pace. OUTSIDE CAPITAL.

Mr. Purcell in behalf of the out-ide capital interested in the project, itsted that the company would agree to park Eighth West street, 30 feet in width and would curb and guiter in width and would curb and gutter the keep the same in condition if the city would furnish the water. He said the company would meet the people of Eighth West street more than half way in this matter and would use every effort to satisfy them and build up that portion of the city.

IN EXECUTIVE SESSION.

When the committees went into executive session amendments were of-fixed in accordance with the desires of the Eighth West street people and the concessions made by Mr. Purcell. An amendment was made providing that the company shall park all the streets upon which its lines extend in-side the city limits under the direction of the city council. As to the freight matter an amendment was made prohibiting the company from permitting any of its freight cars to stand on the tracks or switches within the city limits,

AN AMENDMENT.

Fernstrom proposed an amendment requiring the company to sell com-mutation books of 50 tickets for \$2 and books for students of the public schools for \$1.50. This amendment was agreed to by the representatives of the company as was also one requiring it to pay a tax of \$1.50 for each passenger car used in the city. An amendment was also made requiring the company to put its wires under ground in the paved district of the city and to complete its line within the city limits in 18 months. The amendments were all referred to the city attorney who will put them in the franchise and return the same to the council Monday night when it will be passed.
