SALOON KEEPERS ARE BOUND OVER

Blamlet, McGuire and Garrett Are Held to Trial for Robbery.

REMARKABLE HEALTH RECORD

Sanitary Inspector Shows Only Twelve Cases of Contagious Diseases Exist in Ogden.

Ogden, Jan. 26.—As was forecasted in the columns of the "News," action has been taken against the Apex saloon in this city, the proprietors of which have been bound over to the district court upon the charge of robbery. That the license held by them will be revoked will undoubtedly be the action taken by the council.

At the session of the city council last evening a communication was received from Chief of Police Browning calling the attention of the members to the charge of robbery that is pending against Blamlet, McGuire and Garrett, proprietors of the Apex saloon, and asked that some action be taken. The communication was referred to the law committee.

City Recorder Brown was granted a 10 days' leave of absence and the council decided to adjourn for two weeks so that a large amount of work in his office which has accumulated during the past six weeks can be finished.

The auditor was instructed to draw warrants for \$3,328.65 less \$187.60 in favor of the directors of the Carnegie library, which is due the institution for its portion of city taxes. The last named amount will be deducted to defray the light bill at the library for the past year, which has been paid by the city.

To the engineering committee was referred a request from City Engineer Parker to have changes made in the vault in his office necessary for the filing and indexing of the papers in the engineering department. The cost not to exceed \$100 and the committee is clothed with authority to act.

Payrolls for the half month amounting to \$747.44 were allowed.

The report of the sanitary inspector shows only 12 contagious diseases now in this city, which is considered a remarkably good record for this season of the year.

OGDEN NEWS IN BRIEF.

Connell-Martin Wedding.—A marriage license was issued late yesterday afternoon to Stephen D. Connell and Nellie Martin, both of Ogden.

Funeral of Madeline Peterson.—The funeral of Madeline Peterson will be held in the Wilson ward meetinghouse Wednesday at 11:30 a. m., with burial in the city cemetery.

Estate of Corinne Lawrence.—Klebs and D. Lawrence has filed a petition for appointment of administration in the estate of Corinne K. Lawrence, deceased. The estate is valued at \$300.

Sheriff to Sell Property.—In the case of J. H. Kurtz, trustee, against the Ogden Canyon Sanitarium company, in which judgment was returned in the plaintiff's favor on Jan. 15, Judge Howell has issued an order directing the sheriff to sell the property on Feb. 16 to satisfy a claim of \$18,000.

To Hold Sanitary Inquiry.—Domestic Pantone, the Italian in custody here, has been remanded to the custody of the sheriff to await an inquiry into his mental condition before the district court and a commission of physicians.

Charges Failure to Provide.—A suit for a divorce has been filed in the district court by Nellie J. Booth against Leroy T. Booth, upon the grounds of failure to provide. The couple were married in Ogden Sept. 21, 1903. The plaintiff asks for the custody of a 5-year-old child.

Holding Coppe's Body.—Tan body Charles Coppe, a resident of Madison, Utah, who dropped dead on Twenty-fifth street, Sunday afternoon, is being held at the Lundquist Undertaking parlors, awaiting information regarding the family of the deceased. The deceased is about 30 years of age, and has been in Ogden only a few days.

Leaves With Prisoners.—Detective Hart of the Union Pacific has left for Butte, Wyoming, having in custody Frank and George Roberts and Frank Hill, who are wanted in that town upon the charge of stealing and forging the name on a Union Pacific pay check to the amount of \$84. Hart arrested Roberts at Evanston and later at Ogden Hart arrested Officer Bob Burke arrested Frank Roberts and Hill in this city.

Nobody Wants Dudley.—One of the most peculiar cases that has been called to the attention of the police is a number of months of the efforts of a man to break in jail in the case of Gordon Dudley, who surrendered himself in the police last week with the statement that he is wanted in Portland, Oregon, on the charge of forgery. According to the advice received from Portland officers, no such person as Dudley is wanted there.

Burns Anniversary.—At the Commercial academy last evening the one hundred and fifteenth anniversary of the birth of Robert Burns, the famous Scotch poet, was observed in the most fitting manner. A program of great merit with vocal and instrumental selections and addresses was carried out. The speaker of the evening was Hon. B. H. Roberts, who eulogized the life of the great poet. After the program a dinner was given. The affair was attended by about 200 persons.

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
