NEWS FROM THE NETHERLANDS.

AMSTERDAM, December, 1886.

Editor Deseret News:

Dear Brother— It is about seven months since I began laboring as a missionary. It is not very often that the Saints in Utah hear anything from the Netherlands through your columns. On the 30th day of March, 1886, I received my notice from the authorities of the Church to come to this country on a mission. In company with Elder H. Krumpferman I left Ogden City, and on the 25th of April we arrived at New York, departed on the 27th, on the Arizona, and arrived at Liverpool on the 7th of May last, and on the 10th of May we arrived in the Netherlands, the country of dams and dykes. Since that time I have been laboring in the city of Amsterdam, rejoicing day by day in the exercise of my calling. Hundreds of people have heard my testimony. We hold three meetings every week. Elder N. Krumpferman and myself are working together. The work of the Lord is prospering in this country. We have about 130 members in this conference, and most of them are true Saints. Elder Krumpferman and myself have baptized 10 members since our arrival. Many thousands have not yet heard the Gospel. The ministers are very angry at us, and they have a desire to see us banished from this country. They are afraid that they shall lose their job. The people as a rule are very self-righteous, so far as religion is concerned, and also very hardened and stiff-necked. The spirit of investigation does not prevail and they will not listen to the warning voice of God's servants, informing them that the judgments of God are near, but there shall come a time when they shall know that the Lord has desired to gather them together as a hen gathereth her chickens under her wings, but they would not, and then shall it be too late.

There are altogether four missionaries in this conference and room for eight or ten more, for the harvest is great and the laborers are few. Our President, J. W. F. Volker, is at present laboring in Groninger, and the work of the Lord is growing and Satan's powers are diminishing.

OGDEN OCCURRENCES.

Inquest and Verdict on the Body of the Little Unfortunate—Another Veteran Gone—A Sad Occurrence, Etc.

January 11th.

Everything here is extremely quiet. The finding of the remains of the infant reported in Monday's issue of the NEWS has excited a great deal of comment, horror and disgust. The coroner's jury met pursuant to adjournment on Monday, but had to adjourn again until this morning, when they met at 10 o'clock.

Dr. A. S. Condon was present and completed the post-mortem examination of the body and underwent a thorough catechising by the inquisitors. Several other witnesses were sworn as to what they knew, if anything, in relation to this mysterious affair. The inquest lasted till near 4 o'clock this afternoon, when the jury arrived at the following

An inquisition at which Daniel Hamer was sworn and acted as official reporter, holden at Ogden City, Ogden Precinct, Weber County, on the 11th day of January, A. The said jurors, upon their oaths, do find from the evidence that the said infant was a full time child, that it had lived, and that it came to its death by foul means and exposure.

No clue has at present been found to the perpetrators of the unnatural deed, but no pains will be spared and no just means left untried to ferret them out and bring them to punishment. It is seldom that such a discovery as the above has been made in this city.

There is still a dearth of business in the justice's court here. Not an arrest to day; indeed it is a fact that Judge Dee has not had a case before him since the close of the year 1886.

For several days past we have been visited with light snowfalls. The ground being already frozen, the snow remains unmelted, and as a result the gliding vehicles are got out, and the peals of joyous laughter mingle with the music of the sleigh bells as they sing out merrily upon the crisp and bracing atmosphere.

ONE BY ONE

the old Mormon Veterans are passing away, and ere many more years have joined the eternities, but few will be left who were personally acquainted with the Prophet Joseph Smith. About six o'clock on Saturday night, the 8th

instant, Mother Louisa Ward Higgenbotham breathed her last in this city. She was one of the earliest converts of the Gospel through the labors of the late President J. M. Grant. Under his preaching she became convinced of the truth, and was by him baptized into the Church in 1841. Shortly afterwards Elder Grant baptized her husband, and together they emigrated, in 1843 to Nauvoo. They resided there until the general exodus when, in common with thousands of others, they were forced from their homes into exile into the wilderness. They came on as far as Council Bluffs, and after staying there some time, they returned to Virginia to dispose of some property they had previous to coming to Utah. Before they could get away again the civil war broke out, and they were prevented from leaving. On July 3d, 1862, her husband died. In 1864 she gathered up what means she could and emigrated to Utah. She settled for some time in Provo Valley, and in 1866 came to Ogden where she has ever since resided until her death.

The funeral services were held at the residence of her daughter and son-in-law, Brother and Sister D. H. Peery. There was a very large congregation on the occasion. The speakers at the obsequies were Elders D. M. Stuart, John C. Thompson, T. B. Lewis and Apostle F. D. Richards, all of whom bore strong testimonies to her excellence and fidelity as a Latter-day Saint. One of these brethren had been acquainted with her over forty years, and all had known her many years, which warranted them in speaking in the highest terms of her many virtues. She was quiet and very unobtrusive, yet in her quiet way she had lured many to investigate and embrace the Gospel, among whom were two of the speakers, John C. Thompson and T. B. Lewis. Her remains were followed by a long cortege to their resting place in the Ogden Cemetery, where the dedicatory prayer was offered by Elder Lorin Farr. She has had seven children, 18 grandchildren and three great grandchildren, most of whom survive her.

On Friday evening a sad scene occurred at the home of Brother Cobabe in which he lost his wife. She died in child-birth. She was only in the 27th year of her age. She was an excellent woman, was a good wife, affectionate mother and a faithful Latter-day Saint. She had some six children, two of whom are dead. The obsequies were held in the Second Ward meeting house on Sunday afternoon, when consoling addresses were delivered by Elders K. M. Parrch, Richard J. Hill and Moroni Br...
