Cheyenne, Wyo., March 28 .- The con centrator, power house and electric light plant of the Pennsylvania & Wyoming Copper company at Grand Encampment were totally destroyed by fire at 10 o'clock this morning, the entire loss being \$300,000. The company carried \$154,000 insurance. The smelter, which cost \$200,000, had a narrow escape, and was only saved by carrying water a distance of three-quarters of a mile. A linding snowstorm, which set in short-y after the fire broke out, aided in the work of saving the smelter, which was badly scorched. There was no loss o life, and no one was injured. The entir population turned out and assisted in the work of fighting the flames. The concentrator, power house and electric light plant were built four years ago. The city will be in darkness until an-other light plant can be installed. The company will at once rebuild, but will probably not be able to treat for several months.
