## Competitor-All Records Except One Arc Smashed.

The State high school track and field meet on Cummings field Saturday afternoon was a brilliant affair, a success in every sense of the word and furnish ed some surprises. Records in all events with the exception of the relay, were smashed, the Salt Lake High taking the chief honors, while Lehl did not come up to the general expectation, the Branch Normal coming in second in points won. From a practical standpoint it may be said that Atkins, the remarkable young athlete of the Salt Lake High, won the meet, scoring 20 points for his team, win-ning four firsts, the 100, 220, high and broad jumps. He equaled the record in

broad jumps. He equaled the record in the 100, made a new record of 233-5 in the 230, and beat the record in the high jump by clearing the bar at 5 feet 94. Wheeling took the mile and half mile for Sait Lake, beating hoth records. The quarter was a "dandy" race.
