CONDITION OF MARKET BETTER.

Some Buying by Outside Traders Has Favorable Effect.

DAILY-WEST ON TOBAGOAN.

The Stock Continues to be Hammered—May Day and Yankee are Higher—No Call Tomorrow.

The mining share market appears to be in somewhat better condition and there is evidence of some outside buying of stocks. A prominent broker said this morning, "I shall not be surprised if considerably better prices obtain in some few stocks. I have covered many short accounts for myself and clients, and feel that it was the wise thing to do. With the coming of spring there will be a rush for some stocks and higher prices will be of course the result. On Tuesday the market was in an awful condition and prices were extremely low. The improvement is to a large extent due to the larger demand by traders and the covering of short contracts."

This morning trading was rather brisker than usual and transactions involving 25,555 shares and \$150,588 were recorded. Among the dividend payers Con. Merc., Daily-West, May Day and Yankee came in for some business. Con. Merc. at \$2.00 and \$1.94 was active to the extent of 500 shares and Daily-West after trading at \$2.25 and \$2.30 closed with a bid of \$2.25. Stockholders in the company are awaiting impatiently the result of the conference of Quincy-Daily-West officials, which will occur on Monday. The result of the conference will be of great importance to the company. Reports that the mine is in excellent condition have received verification by the officers of the company and others.

AMERICANS LOWER IN LONDON.

Heavy Offerings at Opening Were All Absorbed.

FIRST LOSSES RECOVERED.

Prices Went to Lowest All Around—Short Interest Buying Steadied Transcontinentals.

New York, Feb. 21.—Prices of American stocks were lower again in London this morning and there were some heavy offerings at the opening in New York. The selling was well absorbed and the declines were restricted to small fractions in all of the prominent stocks. The opening losses in the more prominent stocks were quite generally recovered, but the higher level induced fresh selling for both accounts and the entire market weakened. Offerings were very moderate, but prices went to the lowest all round, with the grangers and Pacific most affected. Colorado and Southern principally rose to above 19. Buying by the short interest steadied the transcontinentals stocks slightly above the lowest. Elsewhere prices moved irregularly. There was a pronounced dip in some inactive and also in some leading stocks. Northwestern 19, American South 19, Colorado 19, Pacific 19, Southern 19, Transcontinental 19, Union Pacific 19, Western Union 19, and others.

The Taylor and Brunton sampler to day reported the sampling of seven cars of ore from Bingham.

Five cars of copper ore from the Neptune of Bingham has been sampled and will be marketed in a week.
