Cheese Strong, 106/12% To Reorganize Asphalt Companies. New York, Feb. 21,-It is becoming ulte apparent that the receivers of ollapsed asphalt companies are making a comprehensive plan for the re-organization of the constituent companies of the trust, according to the Journal of Commerce, Concentration of the business seems to be the great impelling motive, as thereby the expenses of management will be reduced, thus enabling cheaper work to be performed. It is stated that concentration is to be accomplished by establishing three central companies, one on the Pa cilic coast, another on the Atlantic This plan will involve the abandonment of many of the 69 underlying and oper-

ating companies.

It is possible, however, that the plan of three central companies noted above may finally give way to a merger of all the separate concerns into one com-pany—the re-organized National As-phait company. If it is decided to pur-sue this course, the consolidation may

Ip to date there have been deposited at the protective committee about 18,-200,000 of Asphalt of America 5 per cent bonds. It is expected that the auditing committee will receive the complete fig-ures up to Dec. 81, 1901, from the different subsidiary asphalt companies with-in a few days. The auditors will then require from two to three weeks to revise those figures for presentation in their report. This report will be taken up by the receivers and the committee's but will not be made public for some time.

CARE OF FARM IMPLEMENTS

There is possibly more waste incurred on the average western farm by neglect and careless housing of the farm implements and machinery than is traceable to any other one cause; on some farms, we dare say, than is traceable to all other causes combined careless handling of farm machinery seems to grow on some farmers. They bet careless because they are surroundd by careless neighbors, and the bad abits become contagious to an ex-

There is a limit to the housing and care necessary for farm machinery. The mower cannot be run into the shed each night through the harvesting season, but it can and should be put away in the shed or tool house just as soon as the mowing is finished. It hould be cleaned of all dirt; the fron parts that are liable to rust should have a coat of oil. The sickle bar should e taken out and carefully put away in a dry room, where it will not be dis-turbed until it is needed for use next year. The same care should be observed with all tools and implements belonging to the farm. The ploughs, cuitivators, harrows and cheaper class of machines and implements should not

of machines and implements should not be housed in the barnyard alongside the fence. It is much cheaper to build a tool shed or house and store away all these things than it is to help destroy them by leaving them out to be dam-aged by the elements, the sun, the rain, the freezing, the thawing, the general influence of decay which the sky af-fords as an all-year shelter. In addition to the great damage done

In addition to the great damage done by the weather exposure, there is always more or less damage by breakage there stock can get among machinery Cattle and horses often break parts of machines by rubbing on them or by tramping on them. Not infrequently an animal gets hurt by coming in con-

tact with machines where they are set out in the barnyard. A covered building open to the air is a much better protection for ma-chinery than out of doors in the barn-yard, or, worse yet, in the field where the, were last used. It is not as good as the closed building, however, The closed building shuts out all annoyance of stock, it excludes the fowls that are such a nuisauce in roosting on the ma-

chines in the open shed.

It will be found very profitable to use considerable paint on the farm mahinery. The use of paint and oil when the machines are ready to put away in the fall is almost a necessity, if one hopes to keep free from unnecessary waste. The woodwork of the farm machinery will wear much longer by receiving a coat of paint once a year, The iron parts will not rust out if they get a coat of paint or oil. It is much more satisfactory to know when ou want to use a machine that it perfect order to hitch to than to feel wrenches and take apart and see what parts need to be replaced with new, and spend hours or possibly days getting the mower or binder ready for use, When done with, the machine should when done with, the machine should be righted perfectly before it is stored away, hen no time is needed to repair when everything is crowding you in preparation for the harvest or spring

Machines are more easily repaired when you have the defects fresh in your mind. You know then exactly what each little defect needs to make It in perfect working order, and less time and less expense will be required to fix it than if left over until the next season's work is ready for its use. Too much loss is incurred on the majority of farms by carelessly handling the farm machinery.—Metropolitan and Rural Home.
