New Use FOR EGGS.—Every one is familiar with the value of the yolk of an egg as a hair wash, but perhaps may not be aware of its value in clothing cleaning. Beaten up with alcohol, eau de Cologne or ether, like ox-gall, it keeps better and is more powerful; or in simpler cases, it may be used alone or merely mixed with water, to be rub-bed on with fishnel, for removing from colored materials the stains of mud, or colored materials the stains of mud, or colored materials the stains of mud, or of coffee and chocolate when prepared with milk.
