One of the most disastrous floods that ogden has experienced occurred Saturday afternoon about 4 o'clock, when the Sears reservoir dam, located in Burch creek, about three miles southeast of Ogden, broke away, permitting several million gallons of water to come rushing through some fine farms to Ogden, doing damage to the amount of nearly \$15,000, flooding the southern part of the city from Twenty-eighth street south to Third-sixth street and from Adams avenue to the river on the west. Perhaps the greatest loss is in the waste of the vast amount of water that was being stored to irrigate about 400 acres of land situated in Burch Creek. The season is so late it will be impossible to rebuild the dam and store

Bott as a councilman from the Third ward to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of Jesse Harding. Mr. Harding was a Republican and after his resignation the council was composed of five Democrats and four Republicans. The five Democrats voted for the appointment of Mr. Bott and the four Republicans against it. Some of the Republicans hold that it requires a majority of the council elected, not merely a majority of the members who remain, to make the appointment, and the opinion coufirms the contention. "When a city council of a city such as Provo, is composed of ten members and one of them resigns or a vacancy occurs in any other manner, can five of the council fill the vacancy?"

"My reply to the foregoing question must be in the negative. Section 197 Revised Statutes, 1898, seems to be clear and unambiguous. It reads as follows: 'If any vacancy shall occur in the office of councilman by death, resignation, removal or otherwise said vacancy shall be filled for the unexpired term by appointment of the city
