They decided to play a joke on him and hold him up. Ac-cordingly Drysdale took a pistol and laid down in the sage brush along the road, when Sewell came along in his burger. Drysdale humped up in front buggy, Drysdale jumped up in front of the horse and ordered him to stop and hold up his hands and get out of the buggy, Sewell complied and Drys-dale ordered him to turn his back on dale ordered him to turn his back on him, and he held the pistol against Se-well's body and went through his pock-ets securing \$1.35. He then made Sewell get in the buggy and drive on. On his arrival home he told his parents of his experience, but had not recognized Drysdale, who returned to the factory and told the other ampluance who the and told the other employes, who the next day joked Sewell about being held p, and later when Drysdale saw Sewell e told him he was the holdup and gave him back the money. Sewell's father was very much enraged over the occurence and did not take it as a joke and had the complaint issued. The matter will be thoroughly investigated in the courts and may prove a very serious joke for Drysdale before it is ended.
