Speaking of the Rugby game, the editorial says:

"This game gives place to lighter, swifter men. Men of ordinary stature fill the places. It does not represent our physical strength. It can never be popular for the simple reason that it does not. What is the use of saying so, when we known the very element of popularity in intercollegiate are lacking in this game? Come, let us play chess or ping-pong and be done with it. Rugby can never take the place of our beloved lost. Perhaps it is foolish to cry over what is done, for I suppose it is done, but it is more foolish for anyone to entertain fond hopes that this wild, helter-skelter game from New Zealand will ever be interesting; that it will ever draw crowds; that it will draw into its folds the best athietic element. Nonsense. And again let us ask, why the change? Because the game is rough, because men are hurt. A few years ago a man was killed here in a pole vault. Let us discard pole vaulting. Men have been known to break blood vessels in running. Let us discard all the races. The shot is liable to fall on some one's toe and mash it. Let us discard it. It's barbarous. For the sake of safety and solid comfort, let us discard everything rough. Let us mass on checker or something of that sort and not pretend to have a man's game and call it Rugby. Rugby is a good game for track men. They might use it to practise for the mile, otherwise we can see no good in it."

The editorial in the Californian, published daily at the University of California, in part saye:

"Rugby is as much like football as hothand is. It can never take the hold on the students that the old game had. The English apology for a manly sport was once tried in this country, and it required years of modification before it became popular.

"Rugby is no good, it never will be, and we hope that it is dropped off the campus as soon as our tearful prayers pierce the hearts of the alleged reformers who force it down our throats." Speaking of the Rugby game, the edi-
