## SHEEPMEN RETURN. Delegation Worked Against Passage of Burkett Bill at Washington.

PRESERVES RANGE C. B. ## AN OPEN LETTER

Salt Lake City, Utah, Mar. 3, 1908. The Elgin Dairy Creamery & Supply Co., gives its views to the public on the butter situation.

Co., gives its views to the public on the butter situation. There has appeared this day in pub-lic print in this city a statement from the State Food & Dairy Commissioner Peterson, "setting out in effect that there has been a large quantity of east-ern butter dumped on this market and that the butter is too vile for use in the east, but that it is being sold and disposed of to the Salt Lake public as real butter, etc. Inasmuch as the article referred to does not specifically state who has shipped or selling this butter we take this opportunity of stating our posi-tion that the public may not be misled. To start with, this company has never bought or sold a pound of eastern

not supplied as they need it, they roam and wander, haunting old salting grounds used in previous seasons, trampling the forage plants instead of eating them, pawing the ground, and in other ways injuring the range. But if their cravings are supplied, they scatter peacefully over the pasture grounds and feed at their leisure. Salt is so necessary to the easy and profitable handling of sheep on the range, that no flockmaster would think of getting along without it. If sheep do not receive their supply it is only with great difficulty that they can be held in bounds or kept in camp at night, so far as sheep are concerned no resbought or sold a pound of eastern butter on this market or any other market. In the past year we have handled about one million pounds of butter all our own product or that which we bought from Utah and Idaho neid in bounds of kept in camp at hight, so far as sheep are concerned, ho reg-ulation by law is really necessary, be-cause the owners, for their own con-venience, will salt their flocks. But cattle are not herded, and the owners might neglect to salt them, if the reg-ulations were not strictly enforced. which we bought from Utah and Idaho creameries. Every pound of this but-ter has been of the very highest and best grade that we could buy or manu-facture, and from the best creameries in this section, and we do not think there has ever been one pound of our butter questioned by state or gov-ernment officials, as being impure or adulterated, or in any manner below the standard grade. We are opposed and have been to the dumping of cheap, inferior butter on this market or any butter at all from eastern markets as jong as there is suf-

Inspectors Keep Close Eye on Soda Fountain Products.

Local wholesale drug houses are preparing their schedules and making ales for the coming soda water season, Orie which promises to be heavier than ever othe before. According to the trade, there are now manufactured 40 different kinds of syrups all made from fruits or natural original products, because of the new and stringent pure food laws. While the government chemist admits that one tenth of 1 per cent of benzoate of soda as a preservative in foods is not injurious, some states will not allow even that much, as for in-stance the state of Idaho, and no soda fountain syrups can be sold there that contain a particle of preservative or anything suggestive of embalming. So there is a greater demand than ever from manufacturers for fine fruits from which syrups are now made; while the food inspectors are so closely watching them that there is said to be no chance for manufacture any more from acids, or chemicals of any kind. are now manufactured 40 different est les; tern H H0 sold Bell any kind.
