DEAF, DUMB AND BLIND.

Trustees of State Institution For Afflicted, File Their Report.

The trustees of the state school for the deaf, dumb and blind today filed their bisennial report for the years 1903-4 with Governor Cutler. There are, 1903-4 with Governor Cutler. There are, according to the report, 85 inmates in the deaf and dumb school, of which 49 are males and 36 females. In the school for the blind there are 18 inmates, of which 11 are males and 7 females. The total expenses for the two years for the school amounted to \$49,575.53, and the state auditor new reports a balance on hand to the credit of the institution of \$15,858.77. The trustees recommend to the governor that the Legislature be asked for an appropria-tion of \$62,300 for the school for the maxt two years. Only one death has occurred in the institution during the past two years. past two years.

POLL TAX.

Street Department Reports an Increase In Collections of \$1,326.

During the past year the street department of the city has collected the sum of \$12,522 as poll taxes, as compared to \$11,192 for the year 1903, an increase for 1994, of \$1,826. The total crease for 1994, of \$1,326. The total amount of cash collected during the year was \$2,229, an increase over the provious year of \$994,50. During the month of December the sum of \$507 was collected, of which \$216 was in cash and the balance in labor. The work of bringing suits against the delinquents has been commenced and there are now 53 cases in the hands of the city attor-ney.
