The new school of salesmanship was holdover started last evening, in the Y. M. C. A., and attended by a large number of students. The opening lecture was by A. H. Crabbe on "The Need and Oppor-tunity for Salesmen." In the course of licans his remarks, Mr. Crabbe said: "Good salesmen are the exception and not the rule. There is never an over supply of them on the market. While it is true that some of the rare or exceptional capabilities called for in other profes-sions are not required in salesmanship, yet the fact remains that the salesman must meet the many demands of the must meet the many demands of the economic and industrial world with some study or experience. He assumes not only the responsibility of opening up new avenues of trade by making new customers, but of keeping open the old avenues by keeping the old custo-mers. If the merchant buys dependa-ble goods and is satisfied with a fair profit on them, it remains with the salsman to dispose of them satisfac-torily both to employer and customer. Washington-Doubtful salaman to dispose of them satisfac-torily both to employer and customer. Under conditions other than these it would be difficult to do either. The dignity and merit of any undertaking is likely to rest solely upon the charac-ter of those engaged in it. This is true of salesmanship. Undignified methods are more likely to disgust a customer than either to gain or retain his trade. While the salesman should in a general way try to furnish a customer what he wants, yet he should not neglect to THE COUNTY VOTE he wants, yet he should not neglect to strive to estimate what is most suitable for his customer, irrespective of his customer's taste. It often happens in my line that what a customer wants is COMMISSIONERS, LONG TERM. exactly what does not become him. The principal causes for the many fail-ures in salesmanship are probably these: Lack of common courtes, lack of industry or application and lack of appreciation of the fact that the sales-man's nosition is what he makes is appreciation of the fact that the sales-man's position is what he makes it. "As a merchant, and as one who has in the past had long experience as a salesman. I wish to say that had I at the beginning of such career been placed in possession of such helpful suggestions and guiding instruction as such a course as this one offered by the Y. M. C. All day yesterday the "Americans" clung to a forlorn hope that Pitt and Jacobsen had slipped in on the lead over Weir they piled up in some districts.
