

BY TELEGRAPH.

PORTLAND, Me., 15. — Speaker Blaine, in a letter to the *Press*, decidedly refuses to become a candidate for the senatorship.

A private telegram from a republican source, at Helena, Ark., says that military companies are being organized to support the Smith government, and that a report prevails that such government is temporarily established at Helena. Senator Dorsey, of Arkansas, who represents the Smith party, has had several interviews with Attorney General Williams, and last night a representative of Garland called on Williams, and requested him to suspend action until that side had been heard; the Attorney General has thus far received only Smith's telegram to President Grant, and Smith's proclamation, and will have a conference with the President to-morrow.

Among the postal changes the past week for the Pacific Coast are the following: The office at Hampton, Box Elder, Utah, discontinued, and an office established at Brinton, Salt Lake Co., and David B. Brinton, appointed postmaster.

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, 15. — Reports reached here to day, that sixty Indians are raiding in Kerr Co., stealing horses and cattle; when last heard from they were on Johnson's creek. Advices report that General MacKenzie is still at Camp Supply, but he has sent a column to the Staked Plains, in search of Indians.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., 15. — Col. J. M. Johnson, Secretary of State under Gov. Baxter, and who turned over his office to his successor under the new constitution, authorizes a denial of the statement from Washington, that he and other state officials elected with Smith now recognize him as governor. Perfect quiet prevails here. Smith and his Secretary of State Wheeler cannot be found, and Governor Garland will, to-morrow, offer a reward for their apprehension, that they may be brought before the courts and held to answer to the charges against them. Neither Governor Garland nor the legislature, which is now in session, will appeal to either the President or Congress, the State authorities being fully able to protect the government. There is a report that Smith is held in the U. S. arsenal.

NEW YORK, 16. — Peruvian advices, via Panama, Nov. 7, state that the Peruvian government is taking every precaution to see justice done to the Chinese. Under the contract of Hacienda, that had 375 Chinamen employed on it, none of them were registered according to law, and he was fined \$3,070; another, who had his Chinamen with unregistered contracts, had to pay \$330.

ST. JOHN, N. F., 16. — The result of the general election, is a majority of five for the Cartier Government.

Telegrams for the *Republican*, received to-day, from various parts of Arkansas, represent that Smith and his adherents continue arming, and show a determination to maintain their position. Smith's government will be organized either at Helena or Pine Bluffs, where the republican element largely preponderates. The Garland government have made at least 100 arrests thus far, including the editor of the republican newspaper, on a charge of treason to the State.

The President has directed a telegram to be sent to the Governor of Texas, requesting him to delay the execution of the death sentence on Santana until it can be satisfactorily ascertained whether or not he violated his parole, the President believing that the weight of evidence thus far to be in Santana's favor.

John D. Lee Arrested.

BEAVER, Nov. 9. — John D. Lee, of Mountain Meadow celebrity, was arrested at Pangwitch, a settlement on the Sevier, thirty-five miles east of this place yesterday, by deputy U. S. Marshal, Wm. Stokes, and reached here this morning at 8 a.m.

Found Dead.

HEBRON, Utah, 10.

This morning about ten o'clock, Brother James Holt, of Fort Ham-

blin, brought word to this place that one J. Graham, a peddler, was lying dead in the road about seven miles from this place, and about half way between here and Fort Hamblin. The Justice of the Peace immediately summoned a jury and started for the place, and found the body lying with the head in the off track; both wheels of his wagon had passed over the body, cutting a severe gash on the left side of the head. From all appearance and evidence he had been drinking, and fell from the wagon and was killed by the wheel striking and running over him. The jury rendered a verdict accordingly. The team followed the road, and stopped at Bro. Holt's place, two miles this side of Fort H., where it was found this morning when Bro. H. got up.
