TO RECLAIM 225,000 ACRES

F. J. Kiesel and Eastern Capitalists Project Big Irrigation Works.

INTERURBAN FINDS A FRIEND

In Ogden Chamber of Commerce—Matthews Residence Burglarized—Passenger Robbed—Briefs.

Ogden, June 10.—The expenditure of \$4,000,000 and the irrigation of 225,000 acres of rich bench land in Morgan, Davis and Weber counties, are the plans of a private corporation, which are being formulated in Ogden at the present time.

According to the information at hand a deal was closed in this city Monday evening by Fred J. Kiesel and Thomas Fitzgerald, whereby they secured an option on 400 acres of land on the sandridge south of Weber canyon. Other options will be secured as fast as possible. It is the intention of the promoters, who are backed by strong capitalists from New Jersey and Pennsylvania, to erect a mammoth dam in Weber canyon and have a net work of canals extending through three counties.

Assurances are given that the men at the head of the enterprise have tied up reservoir and dam sites in Weber canyon and that they await the adjudication of the water rights in the stream to push forward with their construction work.

OGDEN CHAMBER COMMERCE.

Welcomes Bamberger's Interurban Line to Junction City.

Ogden, June 10.—President Simon Bamberger has a friend in the chamber of commerce of Ogden and it means he will secure the staunch support of that organization in his efforts to gain admission to this city with his interurban road.

At a meeting of the chamber of commerce last evening the resolution was unanimously adopted: "Whereas, The Salt Lake & Ogden railroad is about to enter our city, and whereas the completion of this road will add much to the business interests of Ogden, bringing our merchants in closer touch with the settlements to the south of us, therefore be it resolved, That we congratulate the Hon. Simon Bamberger on the near completion of the first interurban road of importance in the state of Utah, and extend to the Salt Lake & Ogden interurban road a hearty welcome to our city."
