the oath which says that he had resided six months in the territory and thirty days in the preclact, maintained it was absolutely necessary that it should be so. Mr. Cabell was frank enough to admit that he had not resided the required time, and that the oath had been changed to suit his particular circumstances. Will deputy registrar Kessler explain this fraud?

Another man stood in a similar positiou as Mr. Cabell; his residence in the Territory had not exceeded three months. Still, his name was placed on the registry list by deputy registrar Kessler.

A hackman was asked to convey four personators from the R. G. W. depot to the Fourth Precinct polling place in the afternoon. He refused, as he did not want to have anything to do with the disreputable business. He drove to the polls empty and reported ahead that the "Liberal" toughs might be appropriately received. They were brought up in an express wagon. The People's challengers worked on them. They could give no intelligible account of residence or other qualification. Their votes were not refused, but, seeing the situation, they withdrew, jumped upon a street car and disappeared.

A few minutes before the time for closing the polls two loads of "Liberal" personators were dumped on to the Twentieth Ward square. They were also from the **R. G. W.** depot. Several persons wearing "Liberal" badges went among them, whispering gently in their ears, giving them, it is presumed, the names of persons they were to personate. Mr. Patrick warned the transients that if they voted they would be arrested, as they had no right to vote. One of the fellows, who was under the influence of liquor, remarked to one of the fellows, who was under the influence of liquor, remarked to one of the fellows." Finally the crowd left without voting. At about the same instant Judge Hoge appeared at the door of the building and said: "Gentlemen, the polls are closed."

At poll No. 2 the "Liberal" judges acted much more gentlemauly, though they caused a good ueal of unnecessary annoyance. Messrs. Hen.y Puzey and Charles Bansom were among those challenged for having been polygamists. They offered to take the oath that they were not, hut were rejected. Afterwards this decision was reconsidered, and they were allowed to vote. Other similar cases were acted on in the same way. Mr. Bansom, Jr.'s, name was spelled with a final u instead of m, and though he was known to be the proper person, he had to go down to the Utah Commission office, to the deputy registrar, and do considerable more running about before he was finally permitted to cast his ballet.

The proceedings cited at poll No. 1, show the method by which Mr. Williams received two votes more than Mr. Young, thus overturning the will of the majority of the legal voters in the fourth municipal ward with respect to him.

As the face of the returns now hows, there are returned for trustees George D. Pyper, People, and P. L. Williams, "Liberal."

FIFTH MUNICIPAL WARD.

At this district matters were quiet, though a good vote was polled. There was no show of frauds there, probably for the reason that the district is three-fourths "Liberal" and the usual adjuncts of that party were unnecessary. The result was the election of L. U. Colbath and C. E. Mitchener. "Liberals," as trustees.

Those elected yesterday, with Mayor Scott, compose the Board of Education. The political complexiou is: The mayor and seven trustees, "Liberals;" three trustees, People.

CITY COUNCIL.

The members of the City Council were late in taking their seats on July 15th, and the attendance was light, only nine members being present at roll call. One of these was Mr. Spafford, who had not been present for several sessions, having been east.

Messrs. Coombs, Woolley, Hampton and others represented that caual crossings in the vicinity of Ninth South and Eighth East and Lake streets were in bad condition, and asked to have them improved and flumes put in. Referred to the committee on streets.

Richards Brothers asked to have a street opened through block 76. plat A. They owned nearly all the land that would be required by the new street, and would pay the cost of condemning the remainder. Referred to the committee on streets.

A number of petitions for leave to

pile building material in the street were granted.

G. M. Forbes asked to be permitted to use the water from certain springs belonging to the city, situated on sections 28 and 33, T. 1 N. R. 1 E. Referred to the committee on irrigation.

C. B. St. George aud others represented that the Jordan and Salt Lake canal was in bad condition near their property, and asked to have it cleared out. Referred to the canal committee.

G. W. Reed asked to have the fences removed from J street, and made to contarm to the lines of the street. Referred to the committee on streets.

The petition of a Mr. Harris and others for an extension of water mains was referred to the committee on water works. B. A. M. Froiseth and others

B. A. M. Froiseth and others asked to have a certain ditch near the Jordan cleaned out. Referred to the committee on irrigation.

committee on irrigation. Paddock & Stovens represented that they were paying the city for the use of certain sand placers, and that the Council had lately given permission to other parties to use other sand placers free of charge, much to their damage. The petitioners asked to lease all the sand placers belonging to the city. Referred to the committee on public grounds.

grounds. A. M. Grant and C. E. Stanton, in behalf of the call firemen, asked the council to pay for certain equipments used by them. "Referred to the committee on fire department.

C. F. Beecher submitted a proposition to put up street signs at $37\frac{1}{2}$ cents each for single signs. Or he would furnish double signs on posts 9 feet long and 4x4 inches in size, $2\frac{1}{2}$ feet in the ground, at \$1.25. Referred to the committee on streets.

The city attorney reported a bill for a new sewer ordinance, to supersede the present one on the subject Laid on the table to come up in its order.

The city engineer reported in favor of the adoption of the plat of Sherwood Forest addition to Highland Park. Adopted.

The expert water commission submitted a report of the analysis, by Prof, J. T. Kingsbury, of the waters of a number of wells near Liberty Park, Filed.
