

JUDGE LINDSEY SPEAKS TONIGHT.

Denver's Juvenile Court Magistrate
Will Tell How to Handle
Boys.

HAS BEEN VERY SUCCESSFUL.

Splendid Program at the Theater

Lindsey of Denver arrived last night, over the Rio Grande, and was met at the station by Judge Willie Brown and escorted to the latter's residence, where he will remain during his stay in the city. Judge Lindsey is a native of Tennessee, removing in his boyhood to Denver with his mother shortly after his father's death, and he shortly secured a position as janitor in a law office. He was a natural observer of events, and the best of his disposition led him to realize that it was wrong to arrest juvenile offenders and send them to a reformatory. Afterward, when by steady application to business and good habits he rose in the world, and became county judge, he gave special care and attention to the passage of laws calculated to suitably punish youthful violators of the law, and prevent their demoralization by jail associations.

He has organized the probation system, fought and won the battle of juveniles, established a pleasant home-like house of detention for delinquents, made parents, merchants and employers responsible for the moral health of the children under their care, prepared and forced through the Colorado legislature a code of laws governing the treatment of juveniles and has found time in addition to carry on an effective crusade in other cities, states and countries for his method of treating erring children.

Judge Lindsey will be in Judge Brown's court tomorrow morning, and the two judges will attend service at the Ogden Reformatory Sunday morning. In the afternoon, Judge Lindsey will make an address at the Methodist church at Ogden, and at 10:30 a. m. Monday he will be the guest of the ladies auxiliary of the Y. M. C. A. in this city. The visitor expects to continue next to the coast next Tuesday.

SCHEME UNSUCCESSFUL.
Effort to Solve Servant Girl Problem
Fails for Lack of Support.

After several months of effort to establish a successful bureau to stand between the employer and the employment of servant girls, the Mutual Protection Federation has closed its headquarters, and is partially dissolved. Mrs. L. J. Archer, its manager, has opened the books for the inspection of the members and directors, and states that all promises made to working girls to secure them places before the closing of the house, will be kept. She will then open an office in some centrally located building and there continue that feature of the work. However, the home for working girls, the domestic science school, and the cooking establishment for servant girls out of work are to be abandoned.

The federation was formed here by R. T. Cadden, who secured the support of many club women on the grounds that it would do much towards solving the servant girl problem. Mrs. Hal W. Brown, Mrs. H. C. Wallace, and Mrs. L. L. Archer were installed as directors, and the old Clawson home on East South Temple street was secured as headquarters. It was announced at the time that this was intended to be a general club house for working girls, where they could find rooms while out of work, and a library and parlors for entertainment.

It appears now that there was a general failure to support the house. The boarders did not appear, the girls did not apply for positions in the cooking school, and those who were furnished employment failed to pay the charge, as they were trusted till the wages were paid in the future given them. The result has been a lack of money to meet current expenses, and a consequent decision to abandon the home.

Out on Bonds.

Frank Devich was released from the county jail yesterday upon giving bonds in the sum of \$500 in each of the two cases against him. He is charged with assault with intent to commit murder, the crime having been committed at Brigham during the riot among the Austrians there several months ago. Devich has been identified as the man who shot Deputy Sheriff Chidester in the leg, necessitating the amputation of the limb. He was admitted to bail by Judge Ritchie upon consent of District Attorney Lundbom.

JULY WEATHER.

What May be Expected During the
Next Thirty Days.

The local weather office publishes the following epitome of the weather that may be expected for the month of July:

"The normal temperature is 74 degrees, the warmest July was in 1901, an average temperature of 80; the coldest month was in 1887, an average temperature of 72; the highest temperature was 102, July 30, 1889; the lowest temperature was 43, July 3, 1902; the average monthly precipitation is 2.2 inches; the greatest precipitation was 3.42 inches, in 1874; the least precipitation was a trace in 1886 and 1892; the greatest precipitation in any 24 consecutive hours was 3.10 inch, July 25, 1873; average number of clear days 18, partly cloudy 10, cloudy 2."

FARMERS' INSURANCE.

PROCLAMATION FOR THE FOURTH

Mayor Morris Takes Steps Looking
to the Prevention of
Serious Accidents.

CALLS ATTENTION TO THE LAW

Fireworks May be Discharged in Vacant
Lots, But Not in Back Alleys
And Close Places.

Citizens of Salt Lake who are laying in a supply of fireworks for the celebration of the glorious Fourth should carefully read and comply with the suggestions made in a proclamation issued by Mayor Morris. The proclamation was made with the idea of keeping the list of accidents and casualties within the city, and upon the matter of the use of fireworks. It follows in full:

THE PROCLAMATION.

Whereas, Under section 206 of the city ordinance, the mayor of Salt Lake City is vested with authority to the use and display of fireworks within the city limits;

Now, therefore, I, Richard P. Morris, mayor, in the exercise of such discretionary power, do hereby proclaim that the proper use and display of fireworks, rockets, torpedoes, serpents and other explosives within the city, will be permitted on vacant lots and upon the streets and public parks and grounds, under the control of the city authorities, on the Fourth of July next, between the hours of 4 o'clock a. m. and midnight, subject, however, to the following restrictions:

The discharge of fireworks, firecrackers, torpedoes or other explosives in any alley, back yard or other confined place is hereby positively prohibited. The discharge of guns, pistols, revolvers or other firearms or articles is hereby absolutely prohibited under penalty of \$25 for each offense.

The placing upon the cur track of any street railway or upon the rails of any railroad within the limits of the city, any torpedo, bomb or other thing containing any substance of an explosive nature, is hereby absolutely prohibited, under penalty of \$10 for each offense.

The gift or sale of toy pistols, or metal caps to children is hereby absolutely prohibited, and a violation of this provision will subject the offender to arrest and a fine of \$50. Under the city ordinances parents are equally liable with dealers in allowing their children the use of toy pistols or metal caps.

Refrain upon any of the streets, alleys, highways or parks within the city limits are hereby positively prohibited, under penalty of the law, and the police and the fire departments are hereby ordered to be vigilant and exercise authority in the enforcement of all the provisions of this proclamation.

The police and fire departments are especially ordered to arrest any and all persons discharging guns, pistols, revolvers or other firearms, or articles containing explosives, upon any street within the city limits.

ABATEMENTS REDUCED.

County Board of Equalization Cuts
Them Down One-half.

County Auditor Fisher has completed the footings of the abatements and remissions of taxes made by the county board of equalization this year and they show that the abatements amounted to about half of those of last year, while the cash remissions amounted to a little more this year than last. The total abatements this year was \$265,358, aggregated as follows: Real estate, \$24,800; improvements, \$82,575; personal property, \$178,013. The cash remissions amounted to \$4,000.
