

## AN OATH-BOUND ORGANIZATION

Evidence Forthcoming Showing That the Armenian Hunchakist Society is Such.

### SANCTIONS DEATH PENALTY.

Constitution Authorizes the Central Committee to Condemn Any Member to Death.

New York, Aug. 6.—Evidence is forthcoming that the Hunchakist, the Armenian revolutionary society which is being investigated by the authorities, sanctions death penalties and is an oath-bound organization. County detectives recently seized papers in the room of Stephen Kadarian, an Armenian, and one of these documents appears to be the fundamental constitution of the Hunchakist adopted in 1903 and amended in 1905 at the general convention of the society held in Cairo, Egypt.

Asst. Dist. Atty. Manley, who is conducting the investigation, has had a copy of the constitution translated and it appears from it that the central committee of the Hunchakist, which is the governing body but not the supreme group of the organization, may condemn any member to death. The vote of the central committee, which numbers five, must, however, be unanimous, and the person thus singled out for death may appeal to the general convention. The general convention may likewise, by unanimous vote, condemn any member to death, and in such a case there is no right of appeal.

Kadarian has been summoned to tell what he knows of the society and its workings.

### U. S. JUDGE RESTRAINS ARKANSAS SECY. OF STATE

St. Paul, Aug. 5.—Judge Vandevanter, in the United States circuit court, today issued a temporary restraining order prohibiting the secretary of the state of Arkansas from forfeiting the right of the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific railroad to do business in that state.

The complaint was presented to the court by Atty. Hicks of Little Rock. ### SOUTHERN PACIFIC DISCOVERS CAUSE OF WRECK.

San Francisco, Aug. 5.—The Call says that the Southern Pacific finally has discovered one of the causes of the many freight wrecks that have occurred with disconcerting frequency of late. The side bearings of about 500 new cars built on the order of the Southern Pacific for the Pacific fruit express are faulty and must be altered from inch centers to 8-inch centers. This difference, though slight, has been the cause of many disasters. The cars would not stay on the rails when rounding curves. Car experts from Chicago, St. Louis, Sacramento and San Francisco have completed their examination of the cars and have reported their findings to the company. There can be no doubt, they say, that the faulty side bearings have caused the wrecks.

### RUEF'S PRISON EXPENSES.

### SENT TO A SANITARIUM.

Baroness Annie Harden-Hickey, Daughter of John H. Flagler. New York, Aug. 6.—The Baroness Annie Harden-Hickey, daughter of John H. Flagler, has been committed to a sanitarium in Connecticut by order of the probate court in Stamford. There is said to be little hope of a cure. Her mental breakdown is traced back to the death of her husband. John H. Flagler, her father, has been appointed conservator of her fortune, which is said to be almost entirely in Standard Oil stock. The Baroness Harden-Hickey was Miss Annie Flagler. She married the French nobleman in 1890. The baron was shipwrecked on the island of Trinidad and got an idea of becoming king of Trinidad. He took the title of James L. but England objected, and a cruiser of that country took away the entire kingdom to the United States. The baroness was queen of Trinidad for a time, the kingdom being supported on her money. When her husband died she went abroad but was brought back from France to this country when her health began to be impaired. The baron committed suicide in a hotel in El Paso, Texas, in 1898.

## LIFE STORY OF TWO ENGINEERS

After Running Engine for Forty-Four Years, James H. Banta Is Killed by One.

### HAD SURVIVED MANY DANGERS

Geo. Abbott of the Burlington Runs List of Victims Up to Forty-Nine Men, Women and Children.

Chicago, Aug. 6.—James H. Banta, the oldest engineer on the Illinois Central railroad, was struck by an engine and instantly killed while crossing the tracks yesterday. For 44 years Banta had driven or stoked engines over the tracks on which he met his death and had survived four wrecks without injury.

Banta, who was 62 years old, was struck by a train which he had himself driven for 10 years.

Banta was soon to retire on a pension. Among dangers that Banta survived before he met his ordinary sort of death, were the explosion of his locomotive boiler, twice running into an open switch and once falling through the cab window while the locomotive was running at full speed.

Engineer Geo. Abbott of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railroad on Sunday ran over and killed three men near Chicago, bringing his list of victims up to nearly 40 men, women and children. Abbott, who has been 30 years in service, related his experiences of horrors while waiting for his train to go out at the Union station.

"From a haunted, nerve-wrecked man," he said, "it seems to have become a part of the engine drive. I probably have been the most unfortunate railroad man in the country. I cannot remember the exact number of persons that have been killed by the engines I have driven, but I should place the number between 35 and 40."

"I have driven my engine into groups of men and killed five at a time. I have seen a woman hurled as high as over the telegraph wires at the side of the track from the front of my engine, and I have watched a little child rolled along the ties by the tender for 100 feet before she disappeared beneath the wheels of the engine. I have had so many harrowing experiences that I have I believe become so inured to the sight of a face distorted in death—staring at me from the wheels of my engine—that I believe I am unaffected."

Chicago, Aug. 6.—A special dispatch to the Tribune from Cleveland says: According to private advices received last night from New York and Castalia, Ohio, the wealth of John D. Rockefeller has made possible a cure for meningitis. Dr. Simon Flexner, the New York dispatch says, has discovered a serum which will cure the heretofore fatal disease. Experiments made at Castalia have demonstrated the efficacy of the serum. Dr. Flexner is head of the Rockefeller institute for medical research in New York. He will return from Europe in a few days and then

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is expected to announce his discovery through the proper medical channels. Cures have been effected in three cases.

### HALF A MAN'S BODY HELD BY TWO STATES.

El Paso, Tex., Aug. 6.—One-half of a man's body held by the authorities of one state and the other half held by another state, and each state refusing to give up the half it holds, is a situation now existing in Mexico, which serves to magnify some of the incongruities of the laws of the country.

Miguel Martinez, a Mexican Central brakeman, went to sleep under one of the cars of his train while it was on a siding at Esprit Santo, Zacatecas. The train started up and cut him squarely in two at the belt. Half the body rolled to the side of the track and the other half, becoming tangled in the brake beam, was carried to Salinas, San Luis Potosi. The authorities in each state took possession of half the body and each refuses to return the half it has over to the other.

No official investigation can proceed without a body, and as the body is divided, hence the authorities are at sword points, and the relatives of the dead man are unable to do anything.

### THE POPE IS WORRIED.

The Cause is the Outburst of Anti-Clericalism in Italy.

Rome, Aug. 6.—Persons who have seen the pope lately say that he is suffering from mental anxiety caused by the outburst of anti-clericalism. Like almost everyone else he knows that most of the charges made by the clericals, on which the movement is ostensibly based, are false, whilst others are shamefully exaggerated and the church is being made to suffer for the misdeeds of a few black sheep. Two of these his holiness has publicly unfrocked. They were rectors of parish churches in Rome.

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
