

## BRITISH CADETS PECULIAR ETHICS.

Code of Honor at Sandhurst Military Academy Different from That at West Point.

### 'CRIBBING' IN EXAMINATIONS.

How Promotions Are Gained Through Fraud—Laxity of Discipline Revealed by Suspended Students.

LONDON, Dec. 28.—Probably both instructors and students at West Point will open their eyes when they learn what a remarkable code of ethics prevails at Sandhurst Military Academy—the principal training school of British cadets—regarding "cribbing" in examinations. The thing has come to notice owing to the recent "restoration" of three cadets from Sandhurst who were found guilty of having used ordnance maps to help them in making drawings of a locality of which they were required to furnish sketches in order to qualify for promotion.

According to a well known army coach who is familiar with the royal college, the word "honesty" as applied to examinations there is of marvelous elasticity. It appears that in a competitive test such as an examination for entrance to the college, no candidate would think of fraud because in receiving assistance he would gain an unfair advantage over his fellow candidates who depend upon their own brains. On the other hand, however, it is considered the worst of "bad form" for an officer to prepare himself previously to examination for a higher commission, and the more "cribs" a fellow can use when he is the only candidate for promotion, the cleverer he is considered by his friends.

Strange as it may seem, there is absolutely no doubt that officers conducting examinations have not only given cadets every opportunity to cheat, but have actually suggested chances after a candidate has handed in his paper. According to the system now in use, the examiners who make out the questions for promotion examinations are not present at the test itself. The question papers are distributed by officers who are supposed to be without bias, and while they are writing their answers and to be responsible for the fairness of the examination. Besides, each candidate is required to sign a declaration which states that he has received no assistance. It is said, however, that the officers after receiving candidates' answer papers often glance over the work and before the cadet has left the room, remark, "I should look at that again if I were you," or "I see you have written 'east' there; I suppose you mean 'west'." The declarations, too, are signed and collected by the officers in charge long before the examination is over. The answer papers go back to the examiners who, not having seen any cheating, are obliged to mark the work as if it had been done fairly.

It appears also that the Queen's Regulations, one of the books governing the curriculum of the college requires that each cadet be familiar with a number of technical text-books, among them the "Manual of Military Engineering." Not only has the manual been out of print most of the time for the last few years, but even the regulations themselves have often been difficult to obtain. For this state of affairs the college disclaim all responsibility, laying the blame upon the war office.

The dishonesty for which the three cadets were punished seems to be one of the favorite frauds at the college. Since the ability to make and understand military maps is considered of great value, Sandhurst provides an elaborate course in field sketching and requires a strict examination upon this branch from all candidates for promotion, who by lining in the principal topographical features are supposed to work up a sketch which may be followed in conducting a campaign.

According to the code of honor it is perfectly fair to copy from an ordnance map, and it is said that non-commissioned officers make these maps and sell them to candidates for a couple of dollars. The candidates often do not take the trouble to copy them, but hand in the map just as the officer drew it. The three young men who are now suspended were in a party sent to detail in sketches, while the instructor, instead of doing the work they bought an ordnance map. The examiner, however, recognized the drawings as copies of an old map, now entirely worthless, and on account of this "dishonesty" the work of the college decided not to overlook the offense.

It has been ascertained that previous to the coming of Colonel Kitson, the present commandant, discipline was even more lax in this principal British military school. Owing to the size of the college and small teaching staff the instructors could not do anything like justice to their work and the cadets often read novels while the lectures were going on. Army officers say that while the new superintendent is doing his best to make improvements, so small is the appropriation allowed by parliament that the prospect of adequate proper instruction almost vanishes.

### ENGLISH ARE AWAKENING. They Are Aiming at American Agricultural Machinery.

London, Jan. 4.—It is expected that the monopoly so long enjoyed by American manufacturers of agricultural machinery in England and the British colonies will be seriously attacked shortly. I was informed today that a "private circular" is being issued to farmers by a number of leading British engineering firms pointing out that the power of the American patents have now lapsed, and that users of American machines need no longer be afraid to introduce English-made parts to replace those that have become worn out or otherwise damaged. The two or three English firms that have been in any way able to compete with America in the way of agricultural implements are particularly active in the present movement, but the farmers are somewhat afraid of infringing the American patents without serious consideration.

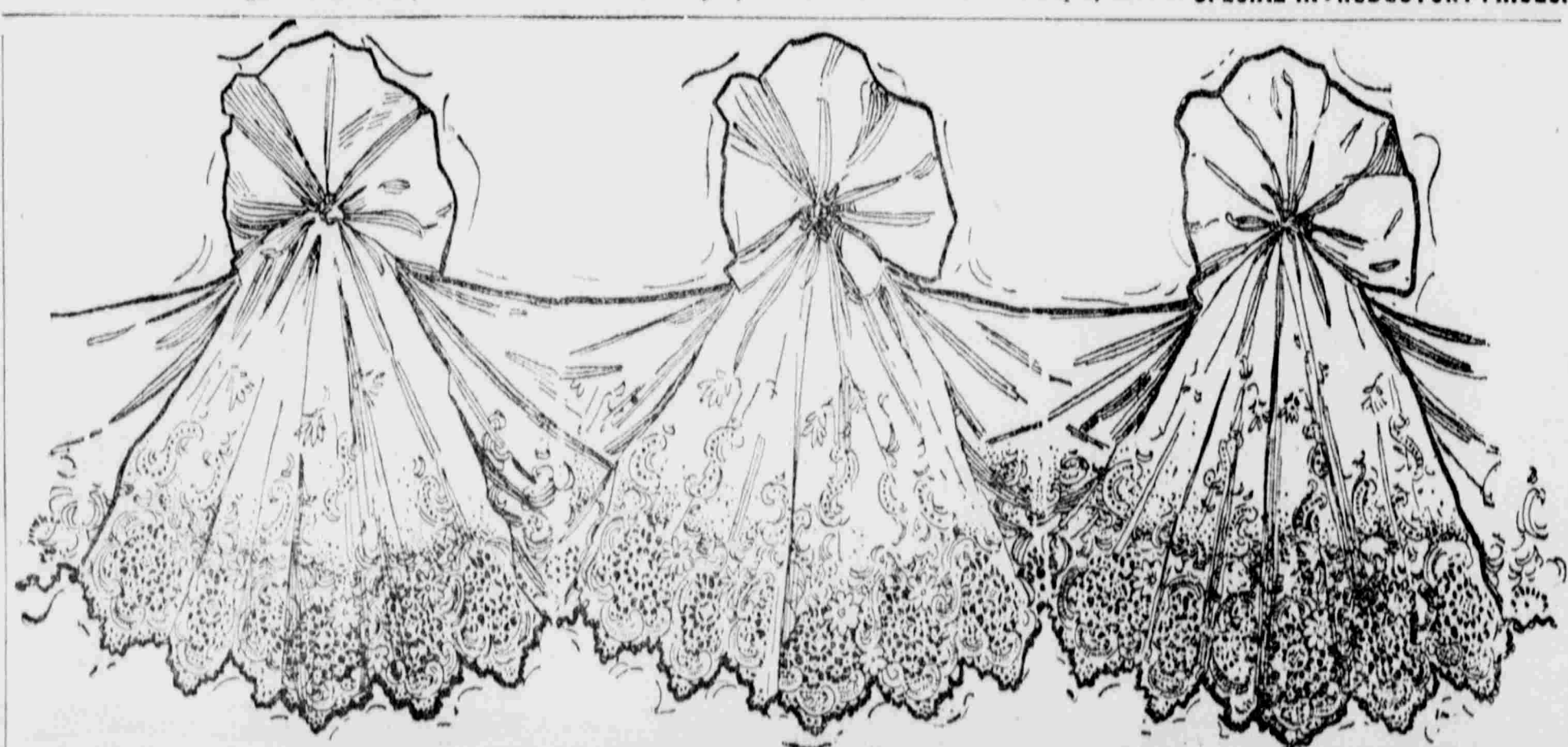
