## ASSESSORS SHORT ON SHEEP COUNT

Weber Commissioners Notified Of Increased Number of Muttons to be Taxed in County.

OGDEN HAS BUILDING BOOM.

(Special Correspondence.) OGDEN, July 30 .- The Weber county commissioners were notified yesterday by the state board of equalization that it had added 40 per cent to the valuation of sheep as returned by the county assessor. With the notice was an explanation that the sheep inspectors found 2,150,000 sheep in Utah, while the county assessors found but 1,400,000. This leaves 750,000 animals unaccounted for, not taking into ac-count the lambs at all; and this leads to the increase in the valuation by the state board, taking the figures of the inspectors rather than those of the ac-

The assessment rolls shows 118 sheep in Ogden and 14,519 in Weber county outside of Ogden, so that the increase or taxation in the county will not be
