James H. Crawford Shoots

Charles C. Lockhart in

Self Defense.

JEALOUS FEUD THE CAUSE.

IS MURDERED

Ogden, July 28 .- Charles C. Lockhart, a colored man who had been employed as porter in Wright's barber shop, was murdered at 7 o'clock last evening on the steps of the barber shop by James H. Crawford, the colored porter at the Elks' club. Immediately after firing the fatal shot from a 35-caliber Smith & Wesson hammerless revolver, Crawford walked over to Officer Al Herrick and handed him the pistol. He was placed under arrest and turned over to Chief of Police Browning and Sergt. Tout who took him to the city jail where he was locked up for the night. The dead man was taken to Lindquist's morgue

Crawford claims that the fatal shot was fired in self defense, and that will be the defense he will put up when the case comes to trial. It seems that Crawford was on his way home and went diagonally across Washing-ton avenue. At the corner Lockhart stracked him with a knife with a blade three and one-half inches long, striking at Crawford's neck. The upward movement of Crawford's arm threw the knife out of Lockhart's hand, and it perforted the trousers of a near-by witness. Crawford then pulled his gun and shot once. The bullet struck Lockhart about two toches above the heart. Lockhart rolled down the steps of the barber shop under the Eccles building and quickly bled to death with his head on the steps.

Those who witnessed the incident assert that Crawford was justified, because it was a case of killing in defense. Detective Pender of the Ogden police force tonight stated that on Wednesday Crawford came to him and told him that Lockhart had threatened his life. He also went to Chief Browning and asked for protec-

Crawford, who fired the fatal shot, gave the following statement to the representatives of the press: "I was up in the club in the Elks' lodge put-ting some notices in the envelopes and

placed under bonds to keep the peace He talked with City Atty. Bagley about the case but as it was so late in the day nothing was done and the result was Crawford was assaulted and his assallant was shot down. Crawford could give no reason for Lockhart having it in for him. He

was asked as to whether Lockhart was jealous of him or was perhaps in love with Mrs. Braiswell, to which he re-plied that he didn't know, but if he was jealous over Mrs. Braiswell he had no cause to be, as he (Crawford) has a wife in California, and had nothing to do with Mrs. Braiswell, who is a widow, more than to simply room and widow, more than to simply room and board there, paying for the same as any other man would do.
