

## LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**THEATRICAL.**—Last night the "Field of the Cloth of Gold" was presented for the first time, preceded by "A Husband at Sight," being for the benefit of Kate Denin. The burlesque was very successful, the applause being loud and frequent, and entirely in order. In the quartette "Beautiful Bella" between Kate Denin, Mrs. M. A. Romney, Miss Emily Denin and John Wilson, a prolonged encore brought the characters again on the stage, and a second was demanded, which, very sensibly, was not complied with. Miss Emily Denin received an encore for a solo and dance; Messrs. Wilson and Lindsay were encored in their first scene on the property horses; and Kate Denin was loudly encored for a couple of original verses containing some local hits. Mr. Mcintosh was very good as Sir Guy; so was Mrs. DeBar as Queen Kathleen, and Mrs. A. Clawson as Suffolk. We must not omit special mention of Miss Emily Denin, whose debut was most successful. She sang very well and played with a good deal of style. Kate Denin as Darnley and John Wilson as Francis were excellent; Mr. Lindsay's Harry was very good. The burlesque ought to have a run profitable to the treasury, for it is one of the best ever produced here, and it is a pity that it is not to-night "Peep O'Day" will be repeated with the same cast as before. We presume this will be the last performance of this drama for the season, and all who wish to see it should avail themselves of this opportunity.

**MILITARY BALL.**—The second reunion of the 3rd Regiment of Infantry took place at the 20th Ward school house last evening. The commodious building was crowded and if possible the party was a greater success than the first one. Such pleasant meetings tend greatly to keep up and increase the esprit de corps, for which the 3rd Regiment is even now so well known throughout the Legion.

**STILL BLOCKADED.**—Owing to the snow blockade both East and West, no trains have arrived at Ogden from either direction, up to our latest advices.

**COMING.**—An Omaha dispatch informs us, that the Pullman Mail train that started West yesterday morning, had every seat taken. The travel westward, from the Missouri, is at present far heavier than that going eastward.

**THE MAIL QUESTION.**—We have had the pleasure of reading two letters addressed to J. M. Moore, Esq., Postmaster of this city, which tend to explain the late mail irregularities in our northern counties. The first is from C. C. Smith, Esq., Terminal Agent at the Junction. He says: "For the last ten days the C. P. agents have reported 'no one at Hot Springs to receive the mails.' The mails, in consequence, have been carried by. I have forwarded your note to Mr. A. J. Under, Chief Clerk of C. P. Route Agents, and if the neglect is with the agents it will be remedied." The other communication is from James I. Terree, Esq., Route Agent C. P. R. R. He says: "Permit me to state that on last Thursday and also last Thursday week I could not deliver the mail for Brigham City at Bonnevillie because there was no person there authorized to receive it; I was therefore compelled to do the next best thing by leaving it at Corinne. Also on last Thursday morning I brought the Brigham City mail of the day before from Corinne to Bonnevillie. Other agents inform me that they have had similar experiences with the same mail."

We hope the ventilation of the subject will accomplish the good we desire, and obtain for our citizens regular and prompt delivery, and that wherever the fault may be, it will be at once remedied.

**SANDWICH ISLAND SUGAR, &c.**—It will be seen by an advertisement in another column, that Zion's Co-operative Wholesale Store has received a new consignment of sugar, from Laie, Oahu, Sandwich Islands. It has been sent by Elder George Nebeker. Besides the sugar, there is some rice, the quantity of both amounting to two car loads. There seems to be much prejudice in the minds of many individuals against using home-made articles; they prefer to use those that are imported, though they may not be of as good a quality. But this falling is gradually dying out. The sugar and rice received have two qualities to recommend them: they are produced and made by our own people, and have been transported upwards of three thousand miles.

We hold it to be our bounden duty to use articles so produced in preference to all others, especially if the quality be as good, as is the case with these. The nucleus of what promises of properly supported, to be a great work, has been established on the Sandwich Islands.

Brother Nebeker and the brethren associated with him do not ask us to pay them more for what they produce than we could buy the same articles elsewhere; but what they ask is that we will pay them as much as they will be content with. We go in for Sandwich Island sugar and rice for ordinary use.

**EXTREMITIES OF THE INDIANS IN MONTANA.**—A Helena (Montana) dispatch, dated the 27th inst., says on the 15th inst., an expedition against certain tribes of Indians, who have been stealing stock and murdering whites for several months past, left Fort Shaw, commanded by Col. Baker. An Indian, who arrived at Fort Benton to-day, reports that early on the morning of the 21st inst., Col. Baker surprised a big chief and his camp of over thirty lodges, and killed men, women and children. No quarter was given. The surprise was complete; only six or eight men escaped. The chief, who was among the slain, is known to have murdered several whites. Col. Baker's loss was trifling. Other tribes of Indians of the same kind, immediately made haste to reach the British possessions, but it is understood the expedition has got permission to cross the boundary in pursuit. This report is confirmed by other arrivals at Benton.

**"AT IT AGAIN."**—That irrepressible correspondent in the East, who does "Mormonism" for the Associate Press, sent the following sensational despatch across the continent last evening.

"Long Island is at present, besieged by 'Mormon' priests and elders, who hold powerful revivals almost nightly. It is said with good effect, as a number of converts are announced."

General Burton is at present at Baldwinville, holding nightly revivals. The people of Jamaica threaten to exterminate them should they attempt to bring about religious crisis in that village.

**ATTENTION!**—The letter in to-day's issue from Bro. Joseph W. Young, calling attention to the noisy demonstrations of boys at places of public resort is worthy of attention, and the reform suggested is most desirable. These boisterous and long-continued demonstrations of applause at lectures, and also at the Theatre are an almost intolerable nuisance. In the main they are no compliment to either lecturer or actor, for they are begun and kept up for pure mischief by a set of ill-behaved boys who are utterly incapable of appreciating fine sentiment either in the lecture room or on the stage. The great majority of those who attend the Theatre and lectures do so to spend a few hours pleasantly, and not to be annoyed by the worse than senseless demonstrations of boys stamping, whistling and hooting, and otherwise behaving more as if they were at a bull fight than at a lecture or theatre. These remarks are specially applicable to the Theatre; and a remedy can easily be found, if the police and ushers will only do their duty, and instantly showing to the door every boy behaving in this unbecoming manner, and refusing them admittance hereafter. Demonstrations of applause when given with discrimination are well-timed and are no doubt gratifying to those for whom they are intended; but it is plain to be seen that a great many boys who attend the Theatre take every possible chance of creating an uproar and disturbance by their foolish practice of hooting and yelling, in the most approved Indian fashion. Attention has been repeatedly called to this nuisance through the News, but hitherto without effect. We hope now, to see it receive the attention it deserves, and that hereafter strict vigilance will be exercised by the officers whose duty it is to preserve order, at that deservedly popular place of resort, and that all offenders will be promptly expelled. If this course be pursued the boisterous will readily understand what is required of them, and decorum and propriety will soon characterize all public gatherings, whether in the Theatre, lecture-room or elsewhere.
