NEW YORK.
A sortie—French repulsed—Progress of bombardment—Tried and sentenced.

NEW YORK, 21.—Carrasco advises report the war in Venezuela over, and Maricao captured by Guzman Blanco, who is now the dictator of the country without a rival.

The World has a cable dispatch from Versailles, dated the 19th, which says, a sortie took place on the 18th, and after two hours of fighting between the forces De Lest and Cordillier, the French were repulsed. Both sides incurred severe losses. The bombardment of the defenses of St. Denis and Arboville has commenced. The Mendon batteries have advanced and are firing into D'Isy, together with the St. Cloud batteries, and have made a great breach in the stone walls, some embrasures were shored with the debris. Last night the French opened on the second parallel towards D'Isy, and mortar batteries have been placed there which will soon reduce D'Isy to a heap of ruins.

Col. Clark, tried and convicted for having in his possession a quantity of counterfeit money, and whose case was postponed until to-day, that a committee of physicians might examine and report upon his mental condition, was arraigned for sentence. Co., partly by purchase in open market and partly through private negotiations, and this is one reason for the great rise in all the securities of the company.

MINNESOTA.
Newspaper quarrel.

ST. PAUL, 20.—There is a lively row in progress, between the St. Paul Press and Minneapolis Tribune, growing out of the U. S. Senatorial contest. A long promising, the Tribune, yesterday, had an expose of the alleged corruption of the Press, accusing it of having bought up to support Mr. Windom, the sum last paid amounting to \$30,000; besides this, the Tribune accuses the Press of several smaller sums, and asks to be required to substantiate them in a court of justice. The Press, this morning, devoted three columns to a denial and explanation of the recriminations.

TENNESSEE.
Attacked and Robbed.

MEMPHIS, 21.—Mr. Holman, editor of the Clay City, Missouri Democrat, it is believed, has been lost. O. N. McGill, Esq., of the firm of Thomas & Gill, while going home, on Big Creek, in this County, was last night waylaid by three robbers, who knocked him off his horse and beat him, and robbed him. He lies in a critical condition. A portion of his tongue was cut off, and it is almost impossible for him to converse.

cession of firing. Rumors insist upon the fact that the fire, being unequal to the German anticipations, the batteries are being re-armed. A general attack, it is said, has been organized for tomorrow, which includes St. Dennis and Cologne. Twenty-two batteries are now in position, available for bombardment. It is said that Trochu has decided to commence a series of sorties on the 20th, which are to be continued incessantly, until peace is declared on the side of the French. Montrose was active on the 18th; great firing on the 19th at the North, and several sorties on the 19th. Thirty mobiles, unrounded, were found frozen to death in the woods in front of Mendon, having been cut off by the advance of the sixth German corps. Several large guns on the road were stopped by the weather.

RUSSIA.
National Revenue.

ST. PETERSBURG, 19.—The Imperial Budget estimates the revenue for the current fiscal year, as follows: Ordinary receipts, from direct and indirect taxes, state monopolies, state domains, miscellaneous receipts, revenues of Poland and Trans-Caucasus, 450,000,000 roubles; extraordinary receipts, from resources from former loans, special receipts and railway construction, 101,000,000 to 103,000,000 roubles.

GREAT BRITAIN.
Schenck will settle the American question—Fifteen deaths daily.

LONDON, 20, 2 a.m.—Gen. Von Glimmer telegraphs to Carlisle that his vanguard is in pursuit of the retreating army of Bourbaki, and that there would be a general advance along the whole line of the German army on the 19th. The Baden brigade is marching to Savern.

A dispatch from Turin, says the Italian Consul has ceased diplomatic intercourse with the government at Tours. The motives which led to this action are unknown.

LONDON, 20, 6 30 a.m.—The deaths in Paris from the bombardment are estimated at fifteen daily. Sickles condemn the inaction of the navy in not intercepting the German-American steamers and telegraph.

A special telegram from Versailles says: "The Germans have twenty-two batteries available against the city. For three days, however, the bombardment has slackened, and for twenty-four hours totally ceased. It is believed that negotiations are pending."

On the 11th, of Vigo, the frigate Auguste ran into a French gunboat. Four officers and twenty-six men were captured.

It is said that Gambetta has asked Faidel to resume command, and has also ordered the cessation of the formation of sharpshooters. Chancellor Gifford issues an interdictio of Judge Emmet, suspending the sale of the American edition of Tennyson.

A Berlin correspondent says that Bernstorff has been ordered to leave the Conference if the war in France is discussed.

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
