

don and St. Petersburg revolutionists. It is said the Czar not only no longer goes out without a military escort, but many high dignitaries who have been threatened also have escorts.

A dispatch from Berlin to the *Standard* says: Porters to guard the doors of houses and to prevent the posting of placards in St. Petersburg, as required by General Gourko's regulations, cannot be obtained, because the nihilists threaten all who undertake the service with death.

General Gourko has apparently been moved from the dictatorship of St. Petersburg on account of the impracticable nature of his orders. A peasant has been arrested with a letter in his possession containing a detailed plan of attack upon the Winter Palace and prison in which Solovieff is confined. Although the letter is probably a hoax the entire garrison was called out. The Czarowitch has received anonymous letters warning him to go abroad. Murder continues to be reported.

GENEVA, 28. — Dr. Weede, of Zurich, editor of the *Neue Gesellschaft*, was arrested a few days ago in Milan on an accusation of engaging in a plot to assassinate the Queen of England and the King and Queen of Italy. His friends declare he is incapable of such a design.

ROME, 28. — Garibaldi has started for Albano, and has published a manifesto to the Italian people, enthusiastically congratulating them on the formation of a democratic league for the attainment of universal suffrage. The manifesto concludes as follows: "The league has decided to work by pacific means, and whoever governs Italy must take note that, by impeding the work of the league, he compels it to resort to other means, he will be held accountable by history and the nation."

LONDON, 29. — Count Schouvaloff has given positive assurance in regard to the demolition of Danubian fortresses. The demolition of the fortifications of Schumla are to be completed by the 3rd of August. Count Andrassy hopefully contends that the Russian evacuation should be completed within six weeks of the 3rd of May, instead of by the 3rd of August, as desired by Russia. The 3rd of August will be likely accepted by Austria with the other powers. It is positively stated from Constantinople that Russia proposes to retain one division of troops in Eastern Roumelia until the 3rd of November. Turkey will not strongly oppose this proposition, as she believes it would tend to preserve peace.

A Capetown dispatch of April 8, says: Col. Pearson and the Ekowe garrison reached Tagela yesterday. Lord Chelmsford and staff are on the way to Dearbon. It is stated the Zulus now occupy Ekowe, but that King Cetewayo himself has retired beyond the Black Umfolosi River. The rumor that the Boers intend to detain Sir Bartle Frere is unfounded.

The official report of the earthquake at Miarh, Persia, on the 22d of March says: Twenty-one villages were totally destroyed, and 922 persons, 2,030 sheep, 1,125 oxen, 124 horses and 55 camels killed.

BERLIN, 29. — On the re-assembling of the Reichstag, yesterday, a letter from Bismarck was presented, asking leave to prosecute Deputy Haselmann for smuggling prohibited newspapers into the empire.

The introduction of copies of three German newspapers published in the United States have been prohibited.

CONSTANTINOPLE, 19. — Germany and France are strongly urging the Porte to concede to Greece the territory indicated in the 13th protocol of the Berlin congress. The intimation has been conveyed to the Porte that the Powers exercising the right of mediation therein conferred intend to intrust their ambassadors at Constantinople to meet in conference to settle the boundary question.

ST. PETERSBURG, 29. — Two regiments of foot guards and a brigade of artillery have lost so many officers by arrest that they have been obliged to draw officers from other regiments.

Four thousand, seven hundred political prisoners were removed from Fort Petropaulovsk in one night to Kazan, Saratoff and other eastern prisons.

The police are openly arresting people by batches at all hours of the day. Hitherto arrests were made at night. On the slightest suspicion against any person, his whole fam-

ily are arrested and domiciliary visits are paid to all their acquaintances, these leading to further apprehensions on the most frivolous grounds. Eighty-three furnished lodging keepers are in prison for not reporting within 24 hours the latest arrivals. Jackovleff, a government official living in the Winter Palace, and his son, an officer in the guards, are among the persons in custody. Baron Bestrom, deputy commander of the St. Petersburg garrison, and Gen. Glidenstaub, commandant of the Moscow garrison, have been superseded for insufficient enthusiasm towards the new order of things. There are few pedestrians or carriages in the streets, but an endless line of porters are seated on stools at every door armed with stout sticks. Covered prison vans frequently pass with a police officer mounted beside the driver, and Gen. Gourko drives round in an open drosky, escorted by Cossacks cracking their whips. The inhabitants are not accomplices of the nihilists, but apathetic spectators.

LONDON, 30. — It seems to be the impression at Constantinople and St. Petersburg that several of the powers are willing to consent to Russia retaining a portion of her troops at some central position in Roumelia, this last portion only to commence evacuation on August 3d.

In the House of Commons, tonight, Sir Robert Peel, liberal conservative, will ask the government whether her Majesty's government will take any steps in the interest of humanity to mitigate the horrors and atrocities amid which the reign of terror is now carried on in Russia over eight millions of people.

PARIS, 30. — The *Rappel* says: After recess the cabinet will itself propose the return of the chambers to Paris, at the same time submitting bills guaranteeing freedom of debate.

Henri Delescluze, who lately returned from banishment in the United States, is dead.

ST. PETERSBURG, 30. — A circular has been sent to all the governors of the provinces directing them to immediately execute the commands of the newly appointed governors-general. This order virtually extends the military regime to the whole empire.

The *Golos* reports it is intended to send 12,000 prisoners with their families from Novgorod to Siberia during the summer.

A great fire occurred in the city of Orenburg on the Mral River, on Monday and Tuesday last, destroying the principal part. The loss is enormous. More than half of the population are destitute of food and shelter.

A dispatch from the governor of Orenburg to the minister of the interior says: A violent storm assisted in spreading the flames on Monday night. The best quarters of the town are in ashes.

TELEGRAPHIC NOTES.

Doctor and ex-Major Stephen Harris, of San Francisco, died at Napa. The Supreme Court adjourns for the term on Monday, May 5th.

The President has nominated Chas. H. Lamont, of Ills., United States attorney for Wyoming.

General Alfred Sulley, U. S. A., died at Vancouver Barracks, yesterday.

The Senate confirmed Wilson M. Stanley, of Ills., Indian Agent of Fort Pinos Agency, Colorado.

"Ucas" is reported to have gone a miss and may not run on Wednesday for the two thousand guineas stakes.

It is stated the President is preparing a message for the House of Representatives, to-morrow, vetoing the army appropriation bill.

Lepere, French minister of the interior, differs from his colleagues about the Blanqui affair, and his retirement from the ministry is probable.

Nearly all the business portion of Gorham, N. H., was burned to-day. Thirty families are homeless and twenty buildings are destroyed. Loss \$50,000.

It is stated the chief object of the Chinese mission to St. Petersburg has failed. Russia having refused to surrender Kulaja, and negotiations have been broken off.

The House committee on agriculture, to-day, agreed to report a bill making it a misdemeanor for common carriers to transport cattle afflicted with pleuro pneumonia or other contagious disease.

The House has added to the legislative appropriation bill its at-

tempts to regulate the pay of the Senate employes, which measure will doubtless be rejected by the Senate.

In a row among some roustabouts or the steamer *Holladay*, in New Orleans, Geo. Jones and James Glyn, colored, were killed, and another, name unknown, jumped overboard and was drowned.

The steamer *Rio Janeiro* ran down and sunk on the 26th, in a fog, the bark *Velocity*. The captain and 10 of the crew succeeded in climbing on board the steamer by the anchor chains. The steward and a boy were drowned.

The sixth anniversary of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows was celebrated at the First Baptist church, Washington, yesterday afternoon. The President and Mrs. Hayes and other distinguished people were present.

A grand procession, in honor of the Austrian Emperor's silver wedding, took place in Vienna yesterday. The weather was fine. The Emperor and Empress reviewed the procession, which was witnessed by hundreds of thousands of spectators.
