CONVENE AT OGDEN

Calls Issued for Convention of

National Association in the

(Special to The News.) Cheyenne, Wyo., Dec. 2 .-- Calls for the conventions of the National Wool Growers' association and of the Wyoming Wool Growers' association have just been issued. The call of the National association, issued from the secretary, George S. Walker of this city,

duty to officially notify you that, in accordance with the action of the as-sociation in convention assembled, the forty-sith annual convention of the National Wool Growers' association, and the fourth annual mid-winter sheep show, will be held in Ogden City, Utah, on Thursday, Friday and Satur-day, Jan, 6, 7 and 8, 190. The past year has been a busy sen-son for this association, and much im-portant work which makes for better conditions has been accomplished. Con-ficinted at our last convention by a bill in Congress that proposed to greatly reduce the duties on wool, and attacked on all sides by interests hostile to the protective policy, the association, which had anticipated the contest in time to prepare for the work in hand, conducted a campaign that finally re-suited in a complete victory for the wool growers—the incorporation in the Payne-Aldrich bill of the Dingley schedules on wool. It was a long, hard truggle, and the association was ably misted by western senators and con-gressmen who led the fight in both houses against any reduction of wool duties. But for the fact of the wool growers being well organized, and with the National association constantly on the job, the splendid results would probably not have been achieved.
