PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 25.—A special

from Philadelphia says a terrific ex-

ploded, the effects of which were felt

for miles around, occurred about 10

o'clock this morning at the dynamite

factory at Bethany's station, a few

miles north of here on the New

Pennsylvania road. Four men were

engaged in the manufacture of dynamite

cartridges, when a large can of

the exploded, tearing the building

to pieces and blowing the work-

men in the air and flinging them, torn

and bleeding, many yards away. John

Gaston had his left arm and shoulder

socket and a great opening made in his

side. The force of the explosion was

so great that the earth was rent in

many places a hundred yards away.

Huge pieces of timber were sent flying

as far as thirty feet, and many

chairs, while every pane of window

glass within half a mile of the spot

was shattered into fragments.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—In answer to

the Secretary of the Treasury for in-

formation regarding a least discrimi-

nation by the Canadian government

regarding American vessels and car-

riages passing through the Welland

Canal, the secretary today sent to the

House an abstract from the report of

the commission on navigation, as yet

unpublished, and several communica-

tions from customs officers and mer-

chants bearing upon the subject.

Henderson (North Carolina), from

the committee on judiciary, reported a

bill to amend the internal revenue

laws. It abolishes what are known

as minimum penalties, and

imposes a punishment for the viola-

tion of the internal revenue laws, not

exceeding the maximum limit fixed

by the statutes. It requires that a

warrant issued by a commissioner or

other judicial officer from the coun-

ty of arrest, and authorizes the com-

missioner of internal revenue to com-

promise any civil or criminal case

under the internal revenue laws.

BRUNN (Pennsylvania) suggested that
