LOCAL BRIEFS.

The First Congregational church Sunday school had a picnic yesterday at Liberty Park.

Charles Simmons has been brought to the county jail from Bingham to serve 30 days for vagrancy.

The remains of Kate Warner, who died last month at Milford, have been shipped to Denver for final interment.

The steel beams of the second floor of the Federal building are being put into place, and the stone work is nearly up to that level.

The Home Telephone company has now about all of its poles set east of East Temple street, and excavating for conduits is progressing at a rapid rate.

Joseph Beard, a miner aged 45, died last night at the home of Benjamin Berryman, of miners' consumption. He has lived in this country four years, coming from Butte.

The brick contract for the new Anheuser-Busch bottling establishment in this city, has been let to John Cook for \$4,500, and the carpenter contract to Fred Fryer for \$4,500.

The Forest Dale Sunday school is enjoying the day at Liberty Park, where a program of races, baseball, tug-of-war, donkey riding and other sports was carried out this afternoon.

With the removal of the telephone poles on E street, the street railway company will be able to use the new east track, thus making a clear double track through to N street on Third.

The board of army officers from the presidio sent to this state to purchase horses for the service, will accept 200 horses, at the Salt Lake Stock yards between the 5th and 10th of the month.

Supt. of Schools Brown of Utah county has notified State Supt. Nelson that he is in need of several good teachers in his county. Supt. Nelson will endeavor to supply the teachers needed.

E. C. Hobbs, weather observer at the Tacoma station, is in the city en route to the modern city to which he has been assigned. Mr. Kimball, the Modena official, has been transferred to Milwaukee.

The waterworks committee of the city council is sitting as a board of equalization of water rates in Superintendent of Waterworks Hines' office at the city and county building, adjusting the water assessments.

A structurally weak flat car, while being switched in the center of a line of cars on the Short Line tracks in this city last evening, doubled up like a jack-knife under the pressure. Traffic was delayed but a short time while the wreckage was being cleared away.

The faculty of the L. D. S. university report good prospects for attendance this year. A large number of students are coming in from the surrounding state and so much so that some difficulty may be experienced in securing suitable boarding places for outside students.

The discharged soldiers of the Sixteenth infantry living in this city today sent a beautiful pillow of flowers for the funeral of Gen. Penrose, who was colonel of that regiment from 1894 to 1896. Sergeant Evans, who is now janitor of the commercial bank building, will attend the funeral.

The Wood Life stock company is busily engaged in shipping its annual lot of lambs to the eastern markets, and is keeping the Short Line freight department on the jump. The shipments this year will amount to 50,000 lambs. P. J. Hagenbarth left last night for the north to superintend the work for the live stock company.

A prominent homeopathic physician of this city remarked today, the sad and interesting fact that the medicines of his cult living in this state were unable to unite, so that they could have no state intermountain association like their allopathic brethren. The slight new cars ordered from the St. Louis Car company have been delivered for four motors, and will be ready for shipment to this city this week.

There has been such a demand made for the superintendent's last biennial report from various parts of the country that he is today mailing a copy of the report to every normal school in the United States.

A report gained circulation Wednesday evening that George Summerhays, son of J. W. Summerhays, had been accidentally killed. The family and friends were considerably worried, as George was with his sheep and quite a distance from any station. Their fears were dispelled, however, last evening by the arrival of their son, who was not aware of the excitement he had caused.

Paul F. Ludwig of the Frontier magazine, published at Denver, is in the city on a business trip. He is in the city newspaper man, having served on the Chicago and New York papers, as well as those in Denver. He says the election fight in Denver that comes off this month, is between the people on the one hand and the corporations and the other. The new charter provides for the purchase by the city of the local public utilities, and these the corporations interested do not wish to give up. Then the brevity and the gamblers have joined hands to fight the proposition, because gambling has been stopped and the liquor traffic has been interfered with by the reform element.
