THE CURFEW ORDINANCE.

THE City Council on Tuesday evening considered the form of an ordinance establishing the curfew in this city. It was ordered to be printed and will come up for future action. Its provisions, with one exception, we believe will meet the approval of all citizens who desire to help parents in keeping their children within doors after dark, and the police in clearing the streets from the crowds of young folks that are now permitted to prowl around after nightfall. The exception is the four o'clock in the morning bell, which we think is needless and will serve no other purpose than to wake up good people who desire a little more matutinal slumber. There may be reasons for it with which we are unacquainted, but as it now appears it looks unnecessary and unwise. We hope the ordinance will receive immediste and candid attention from the City Council, and that when it is revised and enacted, special policemen enough will be detailed in the various wards to see that its provisions are

THE HORRIBLE HOLOCAUST.

Women and Children are Men, Crushed to Death.

## Details of the Tragedy.

LONDON, Jan. 19.-The hall in Prin-cess Street, Spitaifields, where the fatal panic occurred last night, was a favorite resort for the Jews of that part of London. Entertaiuments have been given there every night for a long time past. Last evening a benefit per formance was given and the place was crowded. During the progress of the play a man and woman quarreled in the street outside a.d near the main door-way of the ball. The man used violence and the woman screamed. Her cry was heard by passers by, who misuaderstood it and, shouted "fire." the woman's screams and cries of fire

were heard inside and at once created a panic, the audience, numbering five hundred, rising in a body and rushing pell mell for the main entrance. Strong mea attempted to pass them and women and children fell at the door-
