A handsome sword has been present. ed to Major George H. Penrose by the men who served under him in the Philippines. The present is a fine token of the estem in which the major is held by his men. The sword is of regulation size, the hilt of silver and gold, inter-twined, the guard of wrought gold, bearing on one side the coat-of-arms of the United States, on the other the

crossed guns, cannon and swords. The spread eagle forms the top of the guard. The three bands of the scab-bard are of wrought gold the top one representing the American eagle, the second the crossed flags, and the third the spear top, and the entwining oak leaves surrounding them all. The fol-lowing words are engraved on the scablowing words are engraved on the scab-bard: "Presented to Maj. George H. Penrose, Brigade Surgeon, U. S. Vol-unters, by the Members of the Hospital Corps, United States Army, on Duty at the Military Hospital, Calamba, P. L. December 25, 1900.
