HEARST GRILLS BRYAN. Mr. Hearst started his address by explaining his leaving the Democratic party. He declared if William J. Eryan was sincere he should not have approached him four months ago with the proposition to suport him (W. J. Bryan) in the campaign and he (Bryan) would suport him (Hearst) in the next campaign. Mr. Hearst'said in part: 'I have come all the way from New York to make an explanation not an apology, of why I have ceased to call myself a Democrat and have with-drawn from the suport of Bryan.'' CAUSE OF EAILURE. Chicago, Sept. 11.—The termination of operating agreements with various concerns, necessitating their purchase or the alternative of facing their com-petition, was, it is said, a factor in the finencial troubles of A. Booth, & Co., which went into the hands of a receiver yesterday. The proceeds of a stock issue of \$1,000,000 and some \$200.-60 additional went, it is said, to secure control of prospective rivals. The national government is among the creditors of the firm, but to what extent is not known. The firm pleaded guilty on one count to rebating some time ago, but the amount of the fine has not yet been fixed. Wshington, Sept. 11.—In his an-nual report to the war department, Gen. Frederick Funston, commander of the department of California, ex-presses the hope that the war depart-ment will succeed in its efforts to ob-tain an additional number of officers to take the place of those on, de-tached duty from their organizations. He adds that this is the vital question affecting greatly the efficiency of the army.

affecting greatly the efficiency of the army. "The beneficial results anticipated from recent legislation increasing the pay of the army," says Gen. Funston. "are already becoming apparent. Company commanders report that much larger proportion of desirable men are re-enlisted than was formerly the case, and that former soldiers are returning to the sevice. The feeling, akin to hopelessness, that has hung over the army since the close of active operations in the Philippines, has given way to a better spirit and as a result of greater contentment, there is an increased interest in the per-formance of duty, and consequently inefficiency. HAWAII KNOWS JUST WHEN SHE HAS ENOUGH

Honolulu, Sept. 11.—According to word received today, Miki Saito, for-merly Japanese consul to Hawaii and no whead of the emigration bureau of the foreign office, has prohibited fur-ther emigration into Hawaii on the ground that there are now sufficient laborers there already. HORSE THIEVES MAKE HAUL; FIGHT EXPECTED

HAUL, HUIT LA LOTED Butte, Mont., Sept. 11.—A Miner special from Billings says: News reached this city today from Sheriff Bachellor, of Carbon county, to the effect that a band of 35 horses, In-cluding the riding horse of Judge Sydney Fox, had been stolen by rusti-ers who are now beeing with thm to the Crooked Creek country in southern Montana with the intention of drex-ping over Pryor mountains into the Crow reservation. The horses stolen belong to forest rangers with the ex-ception of one oblonging to Judge Fox, and were taken from the Sage river ronge, in which vicinity Judge Fox is camping. Two of the alleged thieves are Stanley Whitman, a half-breed In-dian and Charles Parker, who it is said, belongs to the band of rustlers of which Earl Simpson, now in juit at Red Lodge is said to be the head. Sheriff Herford has gone to assist the Carbon county officers and the Indian police are also aiding in the work of trailing. The rustlers are reported to be heavily armed and it is believed that a fight will result if they are over-taken by the officers.
