HORSE THIEVES MAKE HAUL; FIGHT EXPECTED. Butte, Mont., Sept. 11.—A Miner special from Billings says: "News reached this city today from Sheriff Bachellor, of Carbon county, to the effect that a band of 35 horses, including the riding horses of Judge Sydney Fox, had been stolen by rustlers who are now being with them to the Crooked Creek country in southern Montana. The intention of Judge Bachellor is to send a party of men to the Crow reservation. The horses stolen belong to forest rangers with the exception of one belonging to Judge Fox, which was taken from the Sage river range, in which vicinity Judge Fox is camping. Two of the alleged thieves are Stanley Whitman, here in Butte, and Charles Parker, who it is said, belongs to the band of rustlers of which Earl Simpson, now in jail at Red Lodge, is said to be the head. Sheriff Bachellor has gone to assist the Carbon county officers and the Indian police are also aiding in the work of trailing. The rustlers are reported to be heavily armed and it is believed that a fight will result if they are overtaken by the officers. FOUR THOUSAND MEN FIGHT FOR \$4-WEEK JOB. London, Sept. 11.—The number of unemployed in this city was strikingly illustrated today when 2,500 men surrounded and attempted to make their way into a hospital which had advertised for a porter at a wage of \$4.50 a week and meals.
