REMODELING OLD CARS.

Street Railway Company Receiving And Making New Equipment.

The Utah Light & Rallway company is remodeling 72 of its 125 cars, equipping them with all of the latest conveniences and appliances. As soon as the new cars begin to strive, 11 old cars will go out of commission, including what is known as "the warmed over" cars, rebuilt at the Salt Lake shops from the old John Stephenson make that were the first electric cars to run in this city. When these were brought to Salt Lake they were looked upon as palaces on wheels and regarded by the rounger part of the population almost with reverence. The company has completed the construction of a second locomotive, the first to be built. It is believed west of the Missouri river. It consists of one of the John Stephenson car bodies, repaired and set on a flat car, also made here, and with trucks, air brakes, motors, cic., of course made in the east. The company tried to get a couple of flat cars from the Short Line with which to equip, but the railroad company could not spare even a couple of flats, so the whole thing had to be made at the car barn shops. The "02" is now out on the line where it is much needed. It is equipped with four 40-horse power instance, making the locomotive flat harse power, sufficiently ample for all purposes desired, and is painted black and varnished, presenting a neat and altractive appearance. A second locomotive, the "03," is being completed now at the carbarn shops, a duplicate of the first one built. The company is also building a third locomotive, for Le Grand Young's Emigration canyon railway, which will be turned out by the time it is needed. Manager Wells says the last lot of cars received from St. Louis manufacturers are very satisfactory, as the vestibules are large and the car interiors commodions.

Percentage total solids—Troy, from Salt Lake dairy, 10.94; Troy, from own cows, 11.79; Hub No. 3, 19.66.
The law requires that milk shall contain 3.2 per cent cream and 12 per cent solids.

As the standard is 4.2 in cream and 13.68 in solids, it will be seen that the samples at fault are considerably below, and "watered atock" is charged. City Inspector Frazier proposes to take legal action.


