GROWING FRUIT INDUSTRY, Two meetings in the interest of the fruitgrowers have been held this week in the city hall. Many important problems in connection with the fruit industry were decussed. The growers have decided that Pleasant Grove must have a packing-house and a cannery. Whether this pack-nghouse be secured through a local or-ganization, or through the Utub Fruit-growers' association, whose headquar-ters are at Provo, will be determined next Monday. It will be to the interest of the fruit-growers in this community to organize and lock after their interests more thor-oughly, as Utab's fruit is second to none, and in Pleasant Grove the fruit is as good as any in the state. Peaches grown here are claimed to be more solid than hose of California; they can be kept with the same icing 10 days longer than any ruit on the Atlantic coast market. FAVOR CONSOLIDATION.
