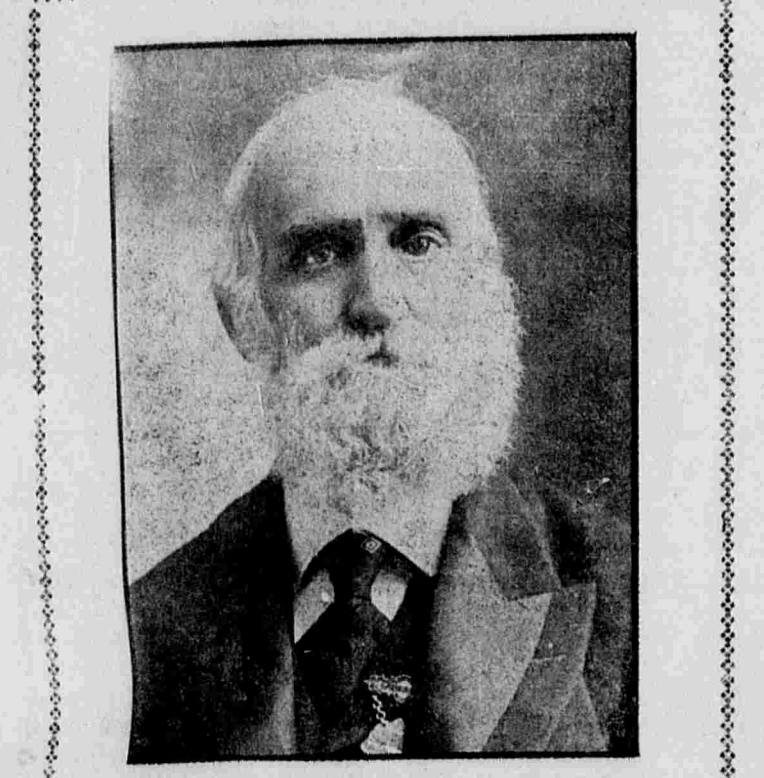
OCTOGENARIAN IS HONORED

Descendants and Friends Celebrate Eightieth Birthday of Patriarch P. G. Taylor.

OPPOSE R. R. COMMISS'N BILL.

Ogden, Feb. 11.—Weber county has another octogenarian. In the person of Patriarch Pleasant Green Taylor of Harrisville, who has been one of the stalwart citizens in the upbuilding of this part of Utah. On Friday, Feb. 8, he celebrated his eightieth birthday. In honor of the occasion a reunion was arranged at the Harrisville ward, in which part of Weber county he has lived since 1851. It was attended by about 150 guests, many of whom were his descendants. Among the visitors were President L. W. Shurtliff and his

BUSINESS IN COURT.

New Organ for Tabernacle Ordered—Nelson-Peterson Wedding.

Provo, Utah Co., Feb. 11.—The case of Andrew J. Stewart, Jr., vs. Hyrum P. Thomas and Erastus Evenson is being heard in the Fourth district court. The suit is to compel the delivery of a deed placed in escrow with Mr. Thomas and deal between Messrs. Stewart and Evenson. Defendant Evenson claims plaintiff has complied with the terms of the contract, while plaintiff claims he has not.

Suit has been commenced by W. B. Seais against the Garden City Mining company to collect \$214.70 alleged to be due on a promissory note.

In the case of Leona Montague vs. Geo. B. Montague, Judge Booth has made an order reducing the amount of alimony to be paid by defendant from \$100 to \$50 a year.

In the case of Provo City vs. Jos. Day, Judge Booth overruled defendant's motion for a new trial and fined defendant \$10, defendant to pay witness fees.

The divorce suit of Frederick Schaefer vs. Carrie P. Schaefer has been taken under advisement.

The Eccles Lumber company has commenced suit against John and Mary Dallin to quiet title to the Geneva Road property on Utah Lake, west of Pleasant Grove.

The present city administration has been endeavoring to buy water for the city water system. It has now been successful in buying a half interest in the Barton spring, in connection with two and one-half acres of water right from the Kimber Barton estate and S. A. Barton; also eight shares in the Pleasant Creek irrigation company. The sum of \$1,350 was given for the same.

FUNERAL OF O. B. HUNTINGTON.

Honored Pioneer Eulogized by Veteran Associates and Others.

Bishop Bringham read a short biography of the life and labors of the deceased, also stated that he had made some requests while in life concerning his funeral services, that the deceased be plain without flowers, and that the Book of Mormon and Doctrine and Covenants be placed on his casket with a beautiful sheaf of grain, formed the decorations.

FAVOR CONSOLIDATION.

New Depot to be Built—Fruitgrowers Want Cannery and Packinghouse.

Pleasant Grove, Utah, Feb. 8.—During the week two of the veterans of Pleasant Grove, John Hanson, aged 83, and Thomas Cobbley, aged 82, passed away. William Coxford, another old townsman, in very ill.

Last Monday a carload of building material for the new San Pedro depot. People are elated over the success

GROWING FRUIT INDUSTRY.

Two meetings in the interest of the fruitgrowers have been held this week in the city hall. Many important problems in connection with the fruit industry were discussed. The growers have decided that Pleasant Grove must have a packinghouse and a cannery. Whether this packinghouse be secured through a local organization, or through the Utah Fruit-growers' association, whose headquarters are at Provo, will be determined next Monday.

It will be to the interest of the fruit-growers in this community to organize and look after their interests more thoroughly, as Utah's fruit is second to none, and in Pleasant Grove the fruit is as good as any in the state. Peaches grown here are claimed to be more solid than those of California; they can be kept with the same jolting to days longer than any fruit on the Atlantic coast market.

FAVOR CONSOLIDATION.

At a mass meeting of the citizens of the Pleasant Grove school district, called last night by the district school officials, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

"We, the citizens of Pleasant Grove district in mass meeting assembled, believe it to be for the best educational interests of the state, and also a matter of economy, that the Agricultural college and State University be consolidated under one management; and that a one-half mill tax be voted for high school purposes; and we respectfully urge the legislature to pass the necessary legislation for the above purposes."
