The Provo Woolen Factory has suspended operations until after Conference, in order to give the hands an opportunity of attending the meetings. It will start up again on next Monday morning.

Quite a large number of people have gone from this city and surrounding settlements to attend the Semi-Annual Conference in Sait Lake City.

Ogden Junction, Oct. 8-

A fire broke out about 7 o'clock this morning in the north end of the premises occupied by Mr. Wm. Gilbert, on Franklin Street. It was first discovered in the wall about fifteen or twenty feet from the stove in the kitchen, and was making rapid headway, and had already burnt through the wall, and the flames commenced to consume a hursay and had also surrounded flames commenced to consume a bureau, and had also surrounded the bed of one of Mr. Gilbert's children. Without loss of time the child was removed, a loud alarm of fire given, when some of the neighbors came together, formed a bucket brigade, went to work with a will, and soon succeeded in putting out the devouring element. Not much damage was done. How the fire originated is not knewn—but it is thought that possibly it originated in a quantity of trash on the north end of the building.

Ogden Freeman, Oct. 8 .-The dedication of the new Masonic Hall took place on Wednesday evening, and quite a number participated in and witnessed the public ceremonies.
