

SIESTA WEATHER HITS SALT LAKE

Disposition is Not Now Running
To the Transaction of Big
Business Deals.

LITTLE DOING IN REALTY.

Shortage of Brick Still Blocking Progress of Building—General Trade Review.

The past week has added another quiet and unimpressive season to local midsummer experience. It is siesta weather, in which the disposition to do as little as possible in the way of exertion along business lines becomes pretty near a ruling passion. Banking operations have gone, or rather drifted along in the unobtrusive tenor of their way.

The Salt Lake banks appear to have plenty of money which has a tendency to be quiet, with deposits reported increasing, and it is said that comparatively little will be doing in purely financial circles until the crops begin to move about the middle of the coming month. Then there will be an increased activity.

REALTY MARKET INACTIVE.

The real estate men report "Nothing doing" this week; that is, hardly anything, but the realty dealers are buoyed up with hopes that they believe will be something more than ropes of sand, and claim there is a good time coming. A few large transfers have been made, but in one case it was merely the recording of a transaction, completed some months previous—the Varian residence transfer. Desirable residence properties are scarce, with the poorly equipped and the costly houses more plentiful. There does not, however, appear any general desire on the part of landlords to rush up rents for houses that are obtainable. Of moderate and small real estate transfers there have been quite a number, and mostly cash affairs. The Real Estate association held its semi-monthly luncheon this week at the Commercial club, but so few were there that nothing was recorded beyond "doing justice to the

repast," and a few exchanges of remarks on the outlook in general.

STILL WAITING FOR BRICK.

Contractors report building operations still very much hampered by the scarcity of brick. They say the brick makers promised faithfully in May that by the 1st of July at the farthest the families would be all off, and brick to be had in plenty. But brick is still scarce, although on the threshold of August, and the smelters are greedy as ever for brick, cement and building material. There are a good many modern homes waiting to be built, and were material easy of access they would be quickly completed, and the situation that much relieved. The real estate men have been super-exercising themselves to bring people into this city, but in view of the scarcity of desirable residence properties it might be well to ease up for a while.

STEADY BUSINESS INCREASE.

The hardware men report a steady increase in business, with strong demands for machinery of all kinds, refrigerators, hammocks, guns, fishing tackle, garden hose, camping fixtures and utensils. The cutlery and shelf hardware trade is also very good; in fact in all lines there is profitable activity.

DRY GOODS TRADE.

In the dry goods trade, some two-thirds of the orders have been shipped from the eastern manufacturers, and it will not be long before fall orders will be shipped out. In the retail trade, the anxiety of the dealers is to get rid of the summer stocks as soon as possible, as it is beginning to draw near to the end of the season. Consequently there are special sales, marked down sales, bargain sales and any kind of sales to shove the summer goods out over the counters; and this policy is not confined to any one class of goods, but in all branches. Dry goods dealers are not anxious to carry over goods until the next season; sacrifice is preferable, consequently summer attire for ladies can now be had at very reasonable prices. Gloves with gauntlets are still scarce, and ladies desirous of purchase have to leave orders to be filled when the goods can be secured from the factories. Very little is doing in millinery as most of the new stock was put out early in the season.

SHOE TRADE LIVELY.

The shoe trade has been lively. If not livelier than ever. The demand for canvas shoes has been unprecedented, and one firm alone in this city sold 2,700 pairs of white canvas Oxfords this season. The prices of leathers remain firm, with no prospect of any reduction in the immediate future, and sales in this city for the past six months indicate a steady increase in the city's population. There is a demand for the better class of goods, even at higher prices, as it is found that buying cheaply does not pay, as there is more or less adulteration. Sham soles are made from compressed leather—that is where cuttings and scrapings are compressed into a solid sheet and then sold as sole

leather. This article does not last very long. Then an artificial leather is made from paper stock and treated with fabrics which is flimsy and endures but a short time.

THE CLOTHING TRADE.

The clothing trade keeps up well, and there is considerable activity in men's wear. It is claimed is not wise in that the clothing are recovering from a less than normal heavy-weight season, and have not felt inclined to place free orders for lightweight fabrics at stiff advances. Standard clays are at a general advance of 5 to 7 per cent, worsteds are up from 7 to 11 per cent, and unfinished wools are higher by 7 per cent than at the opening of the season. But the New England mills are receiving large orders for fancies, and dealers say it is clear from the business now on the books for next spring that clothing favor the more liberal use of fancy wools, and this is regulating their purchase of piece goods. Worsteds and fancy wools in the better grades seem to have fared better than any other classes of goods, and are being called for on repeated orders.

BUSINESS NOTES.

According to local brokers a period of listlessness in everything pertaining to stocks seems to have arrived. There has been a general sagging during the week, which no one seems able to account for, as the banks are all loaded with money, but investors just at present seem inclined to allow their funds to lie idle rather than to buy even the dividend payers. Brokers are puzzled to find a reason for this, unless, as one of them observed, it might be a reflection of the uneasy feeling in the eastern markets due to European conditions, and to the continuation of high rates for money in New York. Local borrowers have been informed that some of the great American corporations have been floating their paper in New York during the week on a 5 1/2 per cent basis. On the other hand a surprising feature is the appearance of San Francisco money in this section, which is accounted for by the fact that the banks there were in tight edge condition before the catastrophe, and that they are now unable to find profitable employment for all their deposits at home. Brokers report that the best demand at present exists for Utah Sugar bonds, interest on which is payable Sept. 1. Consolidated Wagon and Machine company, preferred, Z. C. M. I. and Deseret National, but no efforts have thus far been able to draw out any of the other Utah companies. A block of Consolidated Wagon preferred sold during the week at \$115. Nearly everything in the list below is now quoted ex-dividend.


