

projector thinks that from the manner in which the Pacific railroads have diverted trade from the Isthmus, that this line would take the commerce now carried in English ships, and thus the question of commercial domination of South America would be settled. The bill has been referred to the committee on foreign affairs.

The World's London special says: I hear from Constantinople from a source not likely to be misinformed on such a subject, that the Sultan refuses to permit the Russian and Roumanian Hebrews flying from the most horrible persecution, to emigrate to Palestine in large numbers, or to form permanent colonies there. Many families are ready to proceed to the land of promise, but the Turkish consuls at Odessa and Bucharest refuse them passports. Two hundred families of emigrants are now in Constantinople, literally at the point of starvation.

The inhumanity to the Jewish refugees now at Constantinople daily becomes more marked and inflicts heavy sufferings on these helpless miserable people. English influence at Constantinople, as I need hardly say, is dead to all intents and purposes, but possibly a few words from the United States government might induce the Sultan to show some mercy to the scores of wretched families now likely to perish at his palace gates of hunger. It is certainly horrible that in this century of alleged civilization men, women and children are driven from their homes by a persecution as cowardly, cruel and revolting as anything recorded of the worst days of the middle ages or of the Indian massacres in the new world, should find no help or shelter anywhere.

CINCINNATI, 29.—The Times-Star's Springfield, Ohio, says: A man named Kitzmiller, becoming enraged at his daughter for keeping company with a man of whom he disapproved, shot her dead and narrowly escaped lynching.

FOREIGN.

CAIRO, 25.—The Agents of England and France delivered the following ultimatum to the President of the Ministry:

Whereas, The President of the Chamber of Notables has proposed to Mahomond Baroudi, as the only means of ending the disturbance of the country, the temporary removal of Arabi Bey from Egypt, with retention of rank and pay, and the resignation of the ministry; and if necessary the two governments will exact their due fulfillment. In intervening in the affairs of Egypt, England and France have no other object than the maintenance of *status quo*, and will use their good offices with the Khedive to obtain general amnesty.

ST. PETERSBURG, 25.—Gen. Drantien, governor of Kieff, issued a proclamation to the inhabitants of Balta, declaring that the authors and instigators of the Jewish outrages will be tried by court-martial. If the police are insufficient to prevent the outrages the military will be used. The chief of the Balta police assured the Jews of the immediate repression of attempt at outrage.

CONSTANTINOPLE, 25.—English and French Ambassadors have again assured the Porte that England and France have no idea of any radical intervention in Egypt but are simply considering the best means of insuring order.

CAIRO, 26.—Government has given 24 hours to come to a decision on the ultimatum.

BERLIN, 26.—Reports have reached here of a terrible conflagration in Kieff. The flames have been raging since Tuesday.

VIENNA, 26.—Ritchie, the editor of a socialist paper, was sentenced to 12 years' imprisonment at hard labor for high treason.

LONDON, 26.—One hundred and fifty Herefordshire farmers left for Canada to-day.

MADRID, 26.—At a council of Ministers to-day there was revealed a difference of views on the tariff policy between Premier Sagasta and Ministers of Finance of the Colonies and that of Public Works. The favorable reports of the authorities on the state of crops after the last nine days' rainfall have decided to adjourn the proposed suspension of import duties on corn.

The Captains General of Catalonia and of the Basque provinces report that the agitation is not spreading much since the appearance of several small bands, which slowly retired towards the frontier before the troops.

The Cuban Deputy, Senor Labra, presented a memorial for the im-

mediate abolition of slavery, and the veteran Liberals, Democrats and Republicans will vote for the motion, but the Cabinet declines to modify the law fixing the abolition in 1888.

CAIRO, 26.—This afternoon the Khedive summoned the dignitaries, chief of the deputies and other honorable nobility, also the principal officers of the army, and addressed them in energetic terms on the subject of the existing political situation. He explained the object of the English and French naval expedition and announced he had assumed supreme command of the army and resolved to maintain a strict discipline of officers at present. They replied in insolent language, and declared they would never accept ultimatum of either England or France, nor recognize the right of interference of any power except Turkey. They then abruptly left the Khedive's presence. The Khedive has since received a telegram from the military commanders at Alexandria, in which they declare they will not recognize anybody but Arabi Bey, and demand his reinstatement within twelve hours. After the expiration of that term, they will not, they say, be responsible for the maintenance of order.

After the audience with the Khedive, the notables, ulmas and military officers held a meeting at the house of Sultan Pasha, where the officers used even more violent language than at the palace. A regular vote for the deposition of the Khedive was proposed, but the notables and ulmas unanimously opposed such proceedings. It was finally decided to ask the Khedive to retain Arabi Bey as minister of war, and Sultan Pasha proceeded to the palace with that message. The Khedive absolutely refused to grant the request, and added that the Porte had telegraphed him congratulating him on his conduct and on his acceptance of the resignation of the ministry.

The British and French Consuls-General called on Arabi Bey to-day and declared that they held him personally responsible for the maintenance of the public security. The Khedive has issued a proclamation to the provincial authorities enjoining them to use especial vigilance for maintaining public security. He says the British and French squadrons come to Alexandria with a friendly object, and he orders the complete stoppage of recruiting or supplying reserves. All the men called out are ordered home. The Khedive will announce, in a proclamation to the army, that he personally assumes supreme command of the troops.

The president of the council of ministers has sent the following note to the Khedive:

"Your acceptance of the ultimatum is contrary to the unanimous advice of your ministers, is an admission of the intervention of foreign powers. This incident constitutes an infringement of the rights of the Sultan. We therefore tender our resignations."

The Khedive accepted the resignation.

The agents of England and France were summoned to Ismailia palace. The ministry resigned after refusing the demands of England and France, referring them to the Sultan.

DUBLIN, 29.—Archbishop McCabe was enthroned cardinal with imposing ceremonies.

LONDON, 29.—One hundred moonlighters in North Kerry compelled the tenants on the estate of Hewson to swear at the muzzle of a gun that they would not pay rents unless reduced 50 per cent.

In consequence of a report that an attempt would be made to destroy the government magazines at Purfleet, containing 50,000 barrels of gunpowder. The garrison there has been strengthened and the public have been warned to keep to the main road.
