Utah Flockmasters Enter Suit at Boise Against State of Idaho And Sheep Inspector.

WANT TO SET ASIDE MANDATE

Issued by Governor Gooding Against Utah and Nevada Sheep-Claim Muttons Are Free From Disease.

Orden, March 31 .- Attorneys Maginnis and Corn of Ogden are at Boise, Idaho, to represent the owners of sheep who usually take their sheep into Idahe for summer grazing. They have filed suit in the Federal court at Bolse, against the State of Idaho and G. E. Noble, stock inspector of that state, the complainant in the action being Rudolph Kuchler. This will be made a test case to set aside if possible the recent mandate of Governor Gooding. prohibiting the taking of sheep from other states into Idaho until they had been dipped.

Already the sheep owners of Utah and Nevada have sent a committee to Washington in the interest of what they consider their rights. They were kindly received and assured that they would be protected.

Washington, March 25.-Orders have been issued by the postmaster general instructing the postmasters at New York and Brooklyn to refuse to admit to the main the ad-vertisements of fifty-two illegal "medical offices" located in those citics, and also to refuse to deliver mail matter received adressed to the fictitious and assumed names under which parties conducting these con-cerns hide their identity.

cerns hide their identity. This action at New York and Brooklyn is in line with the efforts previously made by Postmaster General Cortelyou in Boston and Philadelphia to enforce the law against this class of criminal concerns. A statement given out at the postoffice department today says: APPALLING CONDITIONS.

APPALLING CONDITIONS. "The condition of affairs which has developed under the department's in-vestigations in all parts of direct cities has been appailing. It was found that in a large number of instances those engaged in conducting these offices have oriminal records and are 'dope fluids.' In Boston one of the con-cerns excluded by the department from the mails was supposed to have been the office at which was performed the fatal operation upon the young wo-man Susan Geary—the suit case mur-der. One of the 'dectors' whom the department found licentified with sev-eral of those 'offices' in Boston was also connected with the Susan Geary case. The number of deaths that have been caused in these offices can never be known.

"The volume of business done by these concerns wis large. It was said that as high as twenty criminal oper-ations a day were performed in some of these offices, and that the income sometimes ranged as high as \$2,000 a week."
