Urges Election of Men Who Will Purify Business and Support President.

ISSUE THIS YEAR IS MORAL.

Protection Permanent American Policy But Tariff Schedules Will Receive Attention. Sec. 1

Portland, Me., Aug. 22 .- The Republican campaign in the First congressional district was formally opened here tonight with a rally, at which Senator Albert J. Beveridge of Indiana was the speaker. Senator Beveridge discussed national affairs and urged that congressmen and senators be elected who will aid President Roosevelt to purify American business and aggressively support his policy of increasing the prosperity of the coun-He said in part:

The issue in this national congressional campaign is moral rather than economical. It is not the tariff exclusively (protection is a permanent Amer-ican policy, but tariff schedules will re-ceive all necessary attention before the next election), so much as the whole policy of the administration: not so much a mere partisan struggle for mere party success as the ongoing of the movement for the moral regeneration of American husiness; not the condition of the country alone, but that condition in connection with legisla-tion urged and secured, and the execution of existing laws by Theodore Roosevelt and the moral advance for which he stands. Whoever fights under that flag will win; whoever appeals to the people on any smaller issue will wage a harder and more doubtful bat-

"Do you believe in Theodore Roose-velt? That is the question. If you do, you will elect congressmen and senators who will support him. Do you believe that American business should not only be the greatest but also the purest for the world? If you do you will elect congressmen and senators who will ald President Roosevelt in his will and President Rooseren in me policy of purification. Do you be-lieve in increasing the prosperity of the nation and at the same time uplifting the morality of the nation? If you do, you will elect congressmen and senators who will aggressively support Presi-dent Roosevelt's policy of constructive righteousness."

# Senator Culberson Protests Against

# Any Abandonment of It

Dallas, Tex., Aug. 22.—United States Senator Charles A. Culberson of Texas sent the following telegram today to which, up to a late hour, no reply had been received:

"Dallas, Tex., Aug. 22.-Gen. F. C. Ainsworth, the Military Secretary, Washington: In the morning papers here the Associated Press states that Fort Brown will be abandoned, and I will thank you to wire me if this course has been determined upon. It is the duty of the United States to protect the frontier, and as Texas borders on Mexico, it has always been deemed advisable to police the frontier with regular troops, including a station at Fort Brown. While conditions on the border have improved very much within recent years, this course is still advisable, and it would be regrettable that this fort should be ubandoned because the people of a border city like Brownsville object to negro troops un-der circumstances of raid and murder such as recently occurred there. C. A. CULBERSON."

Senator Culberson declined to dis-cuss the matter tonight.

### Canadian Cruiser Destroying Their Nets in Lake Eric.

Washington, Aug. 21.-Capt. Ross, chief of the revenue cutter service of the treasury department, today re-ported to Acting Secy. Murray of the department of commerce and labor that he had received advices that the Can-adian cruiser Vigilant was destroying the nets of American fishermen in Lake Erie. The reports of the fisher-men indicate that the nets were set well within American waters.

The matter will be reported to the state department and will probably constitute the subject of an exchange between the American and Canadian governments.

A telegram received here today from the ex-premier de-clares that health was the sole reason for his visit to Frankfort, all rumors of political aims to the contrary not-withstanding. He will be obliged to remain at Frankfort or in the vicinity in order to effect a cure.

## PAY FOR MILITIA.

Washington, Aug. 22 .- After a month of hard work, Assi, Secy. Oliver of the war department concluded that he had finally made a satisfactory adjustment of the many difficulties in apportioning the appropriation of \$700,-000 for pay of the militia at the man-euvers in different camps throughout the country, but it appears that all is

not satisfactory. In some cases more state troops than had been given in the schedules were sent into the camps and more expense sent into the campa and mare expense was thus attached. This caused a deficit in the allotment of funds, es-pecially in the matter of pay for the state troops. The pay department of the army decided to pay the troops as long as the funds lasted, those who come last mines unpaid. came last going unpaid.

Another adjustment may be made after the camps have finished their after the camps have finished their work, as some camps have not used all the money allotted to them, and the funds can be used to make up the deficit elsewhere. It is possible that Congress will be asked to make an ap-propriation to cover the deficit and the state troops paid next winter.
