LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS. Thermometer.—The mercury only rose to 93 deg. to day.

From Provo.—Hon. A. O. Sano came up from Provo last evening.

Police Court.—A case of drunkenness was fined \$5.

An affidavit against Joe Hawkins for assault and battery, was filed in the Court to day.

For Sanpete.—Sister E. B. Wells and Louie Felt left for Sanpete this morning. They were accompanied by Miss Louie Wells, a daughter of the former.

Collar Bone Fractured.—The Dispatch says that Mrs. George Covey, a lady living near Ogden, on Sunday fell off a wagon and broke her collar bone. A surgeon was summoned and the fractured member was reset.

House Robbery.—Sunday afternoon, a house opposite the Cliff House, was entered by burglars and robbed of \$150 in cash, a gold watch, two silver ones, a suit of clothes, some rings, studs and other jewelry, also some papers. The ingress was made from the back, a key having been used to unlock the door. The suspected person is being followed.

"Pinafore" Again.—On Friday evening and Saturday afternoon, the comic national opera "H. M. S. Pinafore," takes the stage once more. Miss Amy Sherwin, the brilliant prima donna, who has already made a favorable hit here, will personate the character of "Josephine." Mr. Clarence Stevens will play "Capt. Corcoran," and other roles will be sustained nearly as they were when the piece was first presented here.

Power of Franchise.—The influence exerted by prejudice receded a few days to the ground, the day on one of the railroads leading to this city. If our informant is reliable, the incident occurred as follows: A number of persons bathing in the Lake, at a point where the train was not accustomed to stop, had fixed a yellow flannel bathing suit on a stick to attract the attention of the engineer, hoping thereby to stop the cars and get aboard. The omnibus signal did attract the notice of the engineer, but so far from stopping was he inclined that on seeing the yellow ensign flying in the air, he jumped to his position, crowded on more steam and flew by with the speed of the wind. The Sherwin Concert.—If the public had had a fair conception of what was in store for them last night, we are confident they would have filled the Theatre. The audience was not large, but very enthusiastic, every piece being enjoyed.

Miss Amy Sherwin fully reached and even surpassed all expectation. Her first song gave at once a very favorable impression. Miss Sherwin's voice is a strong sympathetic soprano, of a very extraordinary compass; it has the power of captivating the audience immediately and keeping it interested throughout.

In the grand Cavatina of "Sommambula" she displayed her vocal powers to the fullest advantage. As Leonora, in the Miserere scene, she had the opportunity of showing her acting abilities, and we can pronounce her effort in that respect as a perfect success. Altogether Miss Sherwin has pleased her listeners much more than a great many artists who appeared here under different auspices and more loudly heralded.

Mrs. Murtha Porteous possesses a fine soprano voice of great sweetness, which promises a great deal after it has been well cultivated. Her voice is particularly adapted for ballad singing, and after she has learned to use the middle register well and the upper register with discretion, she will be a star for concert singing. Her songs last night highly pleased the audience and she deservedly received encores to them all.

Of the local talent, Miss Olsen, Mr. McAllister and Mr. Stevens deserve great praise for the execution of their respective parts. All three voices deserve cultivation. The duet from Maritana, between Miss Sherwin and Miss Olsen was one of the features of the evening.

Taken altogether, the concert was a complete artistic success and one of the best entertainments given here for a long time. We trust that on Friday, a full house will greet Miss Sherwin in person, and show the lady that Salt Lake City can appreciate good musical talent.

Reproduction of "Pinafore."—To-night, at 7:30 o'clock, the members of the Philharmonic Society meet at the Theatre to commence rehearsals for the reproduction of "H. M. S. Pinafore," under the direction of Mr. Goritz. Miss Amy Sherwin will undertake the part of "Josephine," Mr. Clarence Stevens "Captain Corcoran," Mr. McCurdy as "Dick Deadeye," and the remainder of the cast will be in the hands of our old favorites. The chorus will consist of 55 voices, and the Careless orchestra, under the direction of Prof. Careless, will accompany them. There will also be a set of marines in full parade uniform, properly drilled for the occasion. To-morrow morning, at 11 a.m., the gentlemen of the marriage force are requested to meet Mr. Goritz at the Theatre, to undergo an hour's drill, and on Friday morning the Admiral will review the full force.

The party occupied the guard's quarters up stairs, which had been vacated for their special accommodation.

Exciting Scene.—This afternoon, Mr. B. W. Carrington went to Mark McKimmon's livery stable, ordered a horse, and mounting it, started off for a ride. Just as he had issued from the stable, the horse began to jump and buck in a most furious manner. Mr. Carrington was thrown to the ground, while the animal went down the street, still jumping and kicking, and turning the corner by the Continental Hotel, was soon lost to view. The rider was not hurt, but considerably astonished.

The Election.—The election yesterday passed off very quietly, the People's ticket having no opposition. The returns were light. The number of votes polled in the First Precinct was 236; in the Second, 297; Third, 285; Fourth, 218; Fifth, 298. Total of returns, 1,346.

For Europe.—Messrs. C. R. Savage and G. M. Ottinger, two of Salt Lake's highly respected citizens, left this morning on a trip to Europe. They go for business as well as pleasure, and expect to be absent about ten weeks.

From Ogden.—Mr. Frank J. Cannon, local editor of the Junction, came to town last evening, and expected to return this afternoon.

Returned.—John T. Caine, city recorder, has returned from a ten days absence in Cache Valley.

"Lo" as a Herbalist.—A broad-chested, swarthy son of the forest was on Main Street to-day, selling Indian root to the masses, from a sack containing some excellent specimens of that plant, with all the complacence, and we dare say with much more consistency, than a regularly authorized "king of pain."

Mischief Quelled.—A few days ago we noticed a number of boys using a footbridge across a water sect on one of the principal streets, as a means of playing tricks on pedestrians who come that way. One of the boards in the bridge was broken and loose, and when one end was stepped upon the other flew up, and the person who was passing over would trip up and stumble. When expostulated with, the young scamps would pretend it was an accident, and in a little while would repeat the operation, evidently with great satisfaction and enjoyment, while most of the victims of their mischievous antics, having narrowly escaped a broken neck, would accept their apologies and pass on their way. The last one, however, was not to be deceived by their trickery, nor his resentment mollified by their specious explanation, but catching the young tricksters, treated them to a boxed ear apiece, which had a wonderfully effective result in abating the evil, for with a thoughtful sadness in his eye, each juvenile offender hung his head and quietly moved away from his companions, sorry, if not for doing what he had, at least for being caught at it.

BY TELEGRAPH. EASTERN. The "Times" on Blackburn. New York, 5. Speaking of Blackburn's election in Kentucky, the Times says: His election was a foregone conclusion. The man who served the confederacy by importing infected clothing from Bermuda, and distributing it through the north for the purpose of introducing yellow fever and small-pox into the federal armies is about the last kind of a person whom any community having the slightest regard for its good name would have selected for the highest office in the State. But the Kentucky democracy has never been distinguished for its perceptions of morality or humanity, and it is not to be regarded as some indication of progress that, though Blackburn has been elected, it is by a decidedly reduced majority.

New York Press Notes. The Sun's Washington special says: Seward Minister to China will probably resign as soon as the Judiciary committee of the House can report. Bailey, consular agent at Shanghai will be the next to fall. Evidence has been produced showing that while consul at Hong Kong he appropriated forty thousand dollars of government funds, received as emigration fees.

A Florida official says: The legislature will certainly be called together within the next 60 days. He considers the subject of a charter for the canal. The charter will be granted at once, and in case this is done the canal will be completed within the next three years.

A large Staten Island brewer, who exhibited his lager at the Paris Exposition and took the prize, has contracted with French houses to furnish 500 to 1,000 barrels of beer monthly. The same brewer sent his beer to Australia.

Wheeler's summer vacation. Vice-President Wheeler will spend the rest of the summer at his home in Malone, save for a possible trip to the White Mountains for a few days. He has given up his proposed journey to Colorado, as divers friends having the same categorical complaint from which Wheeler suffers have told him they were not benefited by the Colorado air.

The "Vega." The Alaska Fur Company are disposed to consider the reported escape of Nordenskjold's steamer Vega from the ice in the arctic a canard. They have late advice from that neighborhood to the effect that the season had been very late on the Asiatic side. Strong east winds have prevailed piling up the ice in such a manner as to render it, in their opinion, impossible that the Vega should have succeeded in working out.

Kentucky Election. LOUISVILLE, 5.—Returns from to-day's election are more than indicate a falling off in the democratic vote. Blackburn's majority will probably fall short of McCrea's forty votes. The 38,000 by 10,000 of 15,000. In this city alone there is a loss of over three thousand. There was great apathy among the democrats all over the State. The republicans gain a few members of the legislature, but the democrats still have about ten to one. The majority failed to vote for constitutional convention. In fact it is doubtful if a majority of the 351,000 voters in the State voted at all. In Marion County, Turner, Speaker of the last House of Representatives, was defeated by a republican by 200 majority.

Family Killed by Lightning. ST. PAUL, 5.—A whole family consisting of E. P. Leasure, wife and two children, were struck by lightning at 3 o'clock, on Sunday night. The wife and children are dead and Leasure will die.

Correspondence. OGDEN ELECTION. OGDEN CITY, U. T. August 4, 1878. Editors Deseret News: Our election here, to-day, has been one of the quietest known in this place for many years past. Not the least excitement at the polls. No rush. No stampeding of voters. There was only one, the People's Ticket, in the field, and of course it was elected. There were not great many people out, and very few votes cast—183 in all in this city. As far as I can learn the like peace and good order prevailed and like results were attained in the settlements throughout the country.

One reason so few were out at the polls is, it is a very busy time just now with many of us engaged in the fields sowing their crops, but it is nevertheless a fact that when we have no opposition great numbers of our people become apathetic and neglect the important duties of using their franchise to elect proper men to fill important offices. I hope they will not be caught napping at the time they should be wide awake.
