Local lumber dealers report an uncertain market, and say it is hard to predict just what the spring will bring forth. People with money to invest in buildings appear to be waiting largely to see what the labor unions propose doing.

Amusements

It was like a return to the golden days of 1902-3 which Mr. Pyper had begun to think might have vanished forever—at the Theater last night.

Every nook and corner of the house was jammed with a brilliant audience, and files of people were turned away unable to gain admission. "A Chinese Honey-moon" is a big aggregation of color and brilliancy, fashioned on the lines of "Florodora" and Anna Held's beauty show, and reminiscent in many respects of both. Its libretto and music are of English origin, and occasionally some of the aloofness of the humor plating indicates it, but the show has passed through two seasons on Broadway, and having reached us by that route, many of its Anglicisms are out, and a good deal of Yankee snap injected, so that it sparkles and scintillates like a native American production.

The stars of this company, which, by the way, is a "No. 2" organization, are the midwife, Miss Toby Claude, whose impersonation of the cockney English girl amid her Chinese surroundings, was one of the cleverest and most fetching things imaginable, and Miss Stella Tracy, who, as Mrs. Pineapple, caught the fancy of the audience immensely; her impersonations of Lady Glaser and Anna Held were among the cleverest things of the evening. Mr. Clark, the veteran operatic basso, has his old voice and his old stature, and he, too, is one of the bulwarks of the company. Mr. Edward Clark, as Tom, did some delightful high baritone singing. Mr. Henshaw in the part of the comedian had any amount of "fat things" to sing and to do, and his high methods did not suggest much natural humor, he filled his role well, and his numbers were endorsed to the echo, especially the "Dookey" song, and the "Street in Heaven Called Broadway."

There were a number of excellent smaller pieces of characterization, and the chorus was a thing of beauty and a joy forever to gaze upon. The costumes and the scenery were of the highest degree of magnificence, and the color schemes of the various sets were alone stunning. There is no doubt that "A Chinese Honey-moon" will continue to do tremendous business for the remainder of its engagement.

Yesterday's matinee was not given at the Theater after all. At the boxoffice, the "News" was assured after 2 o'clock, that the curtain would rise at a quarter to 3 and notice was given accordingly. Later it was decided that the performance could not be put on in perfect shape if attempted, and Mr. Pyper, therefore, decided not to give it at all. Between \$500 and \$600 was refunded to those who had purchased tickets for the afternoon performance. The Wednesday matinee will be given as advertised.

The Gus Sun Minstrels played to two "crush" audiences at the Grand yesterday afternoon and night. And right well did they please their auditors. Consideration of the thoroughness of the field of minstrelsy is a remarkably fresh and crisp program was given. The bewhiskered jokes and "gags" of a decade ago were conspicuous by their infrequency and an air of up-to-datedness pervaded the whole bill. The whole was served in appreciative fashion. There were no notable voices, but most of them had in them the elements that please, and please immensely. Mr. W. C. Stonaker was a successful interlocutor, whose work was made easier by end men who understood their business. Of these, Fred P. Russell clearly surpassed his brother minstrels. Russell is a capital entertainer and would attract attention in the biggest burlesque aggregation in the land. Helier, the bounding wire artist, is a top notcher, and John Goss is probably the cleverest bone manipulator that has ever been seen in Salt Lake. There were character comedians who were strong in their respective lines and altogether the Sun Minstrels have made a pleasing impression. They will be at the Grand up to and including Wednesday of this week, with the usual midweek matinee.

The sale of seats for Florence Roberts at the Theater the latter half of this week, opened this morning and the indications are that the favorite star will be greeted by very large and fashionable audiences at every performance.

"The Frisky Mrs. Johnson," a clever and witty society play by Clyde Fitch, will be the bill for Thursday and Friday nights, and the powerful emotional drama, "Zaza," is announced for Saturday matinee and night.
