HELD FOR LARCENY**

**Thaddeus Smith Severely Burned
By Explosion of Gasoline Lamp.**

TWO COUNTY SCHOOLHOUSES

Will Be Built This Year. One at Hooper and the Other at Plain City—Schools Close June 1.

Ogden, April 2.—W. Frank McIntosh was arrested Saturday evening on two charges of grand larceny preferred against him by John W. Hall, route agent for the Pacific Express company. The young man was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Seymour B. Clark at his home on Twenty-third street. With his young wife he accompanied the officer to the sheriff's office, where he secured bond in the sum of \$250 on each charge. Dr. Conroy and Prof. J. A. Smith going to the jail, the complaint alleges that McIntosh stole from the express company, by whom he was employed, \$100 on one occasion, and \$70 on another. He was immediately suspected of the theft, as the packages were checked up to him, then dropped out of sight. He was accused of the offense by Manager Brown, and when confronted with the evidence in the possession of Detective Jones and Mr. Hall, he confessed his guilt, and later made restitution of the missing \$170. He claims that Detective Jones and the other gentlemen concerned assured him that if he would pay the money back to the company he would not be prosecuted. He returned to his home, after setting up, but was arrested a few hours later. McIntosh sent for Attorney Valentine Ogden soon after his arrest, and consulted with him on the case. He has lived in Ogden the greater part of his life, was formerly employed at a local undertaking establishment, and was married about a year ago, and has been living at 267 Twenty-third street.

store and saturated Smith's clothing, which in a few moments were all ablaze, and before the flames could be extinguished, his hand, face and body were badly burned. He was quickly removed to Carr's drug store, a few doors west, where Dr. Gordon dressed the wounds and wrapped him in a blanket, and sent him to his home on Thirtieth street, where he is now resting easier, but it will take some time before he will entirely recover from the injuries received.

The gasoline having spread throughout the store, it was also soon in flames, but the fire department being only a half block away, was on the scene in a few minutes, and by the use of the chemical soon had the fire out. A show case and the counter were partially burned, and a quantity of cutlery slightly damaged by the chemicals.

COUNTY SCHOOLS CLOSE JUNE 1.

Hooper and Plain City Furnish Free Sites for New Schoolhouses.

Ogden, April 2.—At the meeting of the Weber county board of education it was decided to close the county schools on June 1. The reports received from the schools to be in a very progressive condition with unusually large attendance. The board received a communication from the citizens of Hooper, offering a free building site on which to erect the new school house, which offer was accepted. The board has now free sites both for the Hooper and Plain City buildings, which are to be erected this summer, ready for opening next September, when the schools reconvene. The resignation of Miss Marie Paxton as teacher at the Kanesville school was received.

Parley Howell was appointed supervisor of the Slaterville school to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Fred Foy.

GAMBLING HOUSE RAIDED.

Proprietors of Elephant Club Rooms Caught Running Games.

Ogden, April 2.—Chief of Police Browning received a tip Saturday evening that the Elephant club rooms located on Twenty-fifth street had opened up for gambling again. The chief, with Capt. Brown and Detective Pender, shortly after 9 o'clock, made a raid on the place, and succeeded in catching the proprietor, J. F. Smith, running his games at full blast. Mr. Smith and his

brother were placed under arrest, but those who were in the room were permitted to go with instructions to appear in court as witnesses when the case is called. Several Chinamen were among the visitors at the place. Smith and his brother were released on their own recognizance.

INSANE WOMAN ARRESTED.

A woman who gives her name as Clara Evans was taken in custody yesterday morning by the police and later turned over to the custody of the sheriff, suffering from mental aberration. She says she has been employed at Coburn, Nevada, as a cook in an Italian boarding house and came to Ogden. She is about 35 years of age and claims to have a mother, Mrs. Ellen Evans living at Malad City, Idaho. The young woman has peculiar hallucinations, imagining among other things that she has electric batteries attached to her. An endeavor will be made to locate her mother.

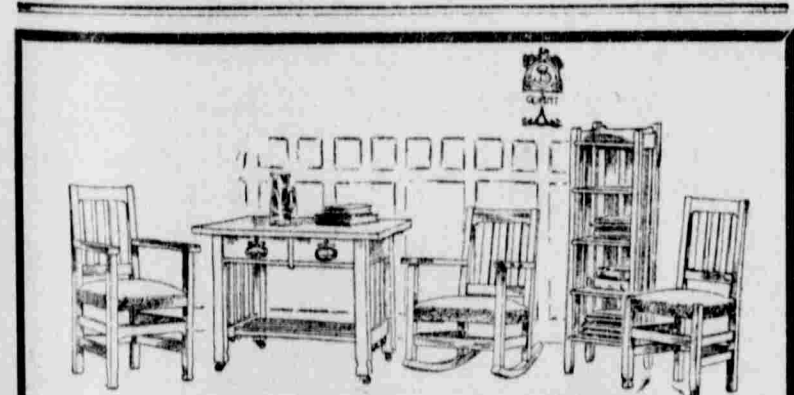
