Elder Andrew Johnson Home Again After Extensive Travel.

65,000 MILES IN TWO YEARS.

A Trip of Profound Interest, Hard Work and Much Personal Enjoyment.

Elder Andrew Johnson has returned home after more than two years of extensive travel. His course was over and about every civilized country and included a complete visit of the globe. Elder Johnson returned home last evening and when seen by a News man today said he left Salt Lake on the 11th day of May, 1935. He went as a special missionary for the purpose of visiting all of the missionary fields, examining the records of the different branches, conferences and missions, collecting and compiling statistical information thereon. He visited the countries named in the following order: Sandwich Islands, Tonga, Samoa, New Zealand, Society and Tuamotu Islands, Australia, India, Egypt, Syria, Palestine, Italy, France, Denmark, Norway, Sweden, Germany, Switzerland, Holland, England, Wales, Ireland and Scotland.

During his sojourn in these countries Elder Johnson collected one thousand Church books, a great many manuscripts and valuable records of which were forwarded to the Church office in this city. A proper compilation of these will be made later. During his trip, Elder Johnson visited the Church branches in all of the countries named above. He visited almost every important branch of the Church in the civilized world outside of the United States and Canada. Oftentimes I preached the Gospel, both upon land and sea, frequently acting as interpreter. I worked hard, had good health and returned home with joy and rejoicing.
