If a separate Kingdom can be established, with the crown upon the head of one of Victoria's sons, such a change would at once be accepted. But falling in that will England agree to let the Dominion choose its future? The Times seems prepared for such a movement.

Miss Tine, the African traveler who is reported to have been killed by her camel drivers in the desert of Sahara, was a German lady of fortune, who has devoted many years to scientific research in foreign countries. The Germans seem to have taken the lead of all other nationalities in such explorations, and have furnished the most valuable contributions to be found in our literature on that subject. Miss Tine was, we believe, the first lady who has braved the dangers of a savage country in pursuit of scientific knowledge, and her untimely death is much to be regretted.
