## LOCAL OPTION IN STATE OF IDAHO

Legislature Is Sure to Pass Laws In Conformity With Platform.

### OPPOSITION IS VIGOROUS

However, the Demand of the Masses is Sure to Prevail in the Gem State.

That local option is likely to carry in Idaho is the import of a Boise, Idaho, special dispatch, which states that laws covering that subject as well as anti-pass legislation were favored by the majority of the Idaho legislature. A great deal of opposition to both the local option movement and the anti-pass law is being waged, the objection to the latter being that it will cost the state \$15,000 per year to carry out. However, the Republican platform committed the party to both planks and it is conceded that provision for local option will be among the measures to receive the final approval of the legislature.

The first bill for a primary election was introduced in the Senate yesterday. The bill is patterned after the Washington and Wisconsin laws and contains first and second choice clauses for choosing United States senators, similar to the law in force at the present time in Oregon. The bill provides that not more than 15 per cent of the salary of the office is the maximum that may be legally expended for campaign purposes.

The Senate Davis of Elmira presented his bill yesterday, which bill applies to railroads. The bill is specially designed for the protection of miners. Spaulding in the Senate introduced a resolution to give the state land bond power to settle the controversy over lands in Shoshone county, held adversely to homesteaders by the state.

Both houses adjourned early yesterday out of respect to the memory of Nathan H. Clark, a member of the ninth session from Custer County, whose death occurred Saturday.
